To The Voters Of Haywood County And Western North Carolina.

Next Saturday night, June 4, will be the time when the people of North Carolina will learn whether the Eastern section of the State will have one United States Senator or two. The Senator to be nominated Saturday, by custom of nearly one hundred years standing, should come from the Western Section of the State.
