

Traps In Pisgah Forest Catch Deer, Dears And Tears

Traps Built For Trapping Deer, On National Reserve Make Unusual Catches
The trapping for the 1937-1938 season on the Pisgah National Reserve was one of the most successful trapping programs attempted. Primarily, this was due to the complete failure of the most crop that the forage available was sufficient to carry the large deer through the winter; also to increased demands from state and federal game preserves for deer for various purposes, the cost being borne by the state under co-operative arrangements. This demand was caused by the publicity given the Pisgah Hunts, Deer Trapping and Fawn projects, also to the awakening of the public to the actual importance of wildlife in their respective states.
All 155 deer traps of the Portapig trap type, this trap was conceived and devised on the Pisgah National Reserve by Warden E. L. Davis and Warden J. H. Dyer, using the deer trapping, using the traps of apples for bait. They caught 253 deer.
Traps were set in Deer Trapping areas. Traps were entered by the deer this season, exit being made by the deer over, under, or through the trap.
Good catches were made the preceding full of the moon. The record month this season was during the deer hunt.
Trap No. 7 made the most interesting catch of the deer trapping season. Two young ladies from a near town who could not resist the temptation of forbidden fruit released by a Samarian passing by, after they shed many tears.
Trap No. 4 had the most unusual catch of the deer trapping season. This was found with all doors down the trapping personnel were sure to catch. Trap No. 19 had the most amusing catch of the season, a sad but not deer hunter, who thought he had caught a deer trap. The hunter was later released by a special policeman of the deer hunt.
Trap No. 12 had the only crime of the season. A would-be deer hunter had an eight-point buck confined in a chute and after carefully looking at and placed his rifle between chute and top of chute and after carefully firing and missed. The buck, ever obligingly moved and the fired two more shots, killing the buck. He then dragged the buck a point about 200 yards away, and afterwards the trapping per-

Transylvania Inmates Might Come To Haywood Home

Transylvania Board Has Matter Under Consideration Of "Boarding Out" County Home Folk
The Transylvania board of commissioners, have under advisement, the proposition of abolishing their county home, and boarding all the inmates of their home in the county homes of Haywood and Henderson, according to The Times, Brevard.
The Brevard paper said: "Representatives of Haywood and Henderson counties made the Transylvania board a proposition, which would save a considerable cash outlay each year.
The news article of The Times continued:
The commissioners have taken the matter under advisement and are making a study of the proposition. No decision was made at the meeting Monday.
Under the plan submitted, people in the county home here could be cared for in either the Henderson or Haywood institution at a little more than half the cost now entailed and at the same time give the inmates as good or possibly better care than is possible at a smaller unit such as is now being operated in Transylvania.
It was pointed out that the average number of persons cared for in the Transylvania county home is 10, and that it costs nearly \$250 per year per inmate to give care to each.
Most of these now in the county home, one-fourth of this cost assistance under the state and federal regulations, and while the cost would be nearly one-half as high to make allocation of funds to each of the old people as it is to keep them in the home, one-fourth of this cost would be chargeable to the county, as the state and federal governments pay three-fourths of the monthly instalments sent as aid to aged people.
Three patients at the home would necessarily have to be taken care of in an institution, but under the proposition made, these could be cared for at the Henderson county home at a minimum cost of \$12 per month, which is half of the cost per person at the small unit operated here. It was pointed out that Henderson and Haywood each have a large number of patients to care for at their homes, and that in caring for larger numbers the cost of operation is naturally smaller per person.
Another factor to be considered is that wherein approximate cost per person to Transylvania county is \$250 per year, this same amount put into the co-operative old age assistance fund would provide aid to at least eight persons at \$10 per month at no increased cost to the county. Thus for the cost of caring for ten people in the county home, \$10 per month could be secured through the old age assistance plan for 80 people at no increased cost to the county.
The commissioners did not pass on the matter at their meeting Monday, but are studying the figures as presented, and are checking with other county boards in the state which are undertaking the same plan.
