## Bethel FFA Boys Adopt '38 Program

The members of the Bethel chapter of the Future Farmers of America met in regular meeting recently to adopt the program of work for the year. The program of work committed to the objectives and worked out the program to the chapter. The local chapter makes a better local chapter each year than the year before, and this progress is made chiefly because the boys set up high goals at the beginning of each year. The program of work for the coming year is as follows:

One out of ten boys using pure seeds of livestock for projects, same number completing requirements.

Twenty per cent of boys plant one or more acres of soil improvement.

Twenty per cent using proper fertilizer or feed for projects.

All boys carrying two or more projects and paying fee.

All boys planting seeds and forest samples to museum.

Improve classroom and shop twenty per cent.

Buy or purchase \$100 worth of supplies cooperatively and raise through chapter activities.

Purchase picture machine and license F. F. A. radio programs occasionally.

Participate in vocational fair or sponsor a community fair.

One-half of members improving grounds.

Cooperate with grange by getting new members this fall.

Four boys establish farm shops.

Four out of every five doing three or more construction or repair jobs.

## Foulbrood Found In Haywood Bees

Haywood is one of the 48 counties infected with foulbrood, most costly of bee diseases and the State Department of Agriculture has issued an order prohibiting the wholesale shipment of bees into North Carolina.

Fearing the further spread of foulbrood, C. H. Brannon, Department Chief Entomologist, said that "strict bee regulations are necessary at present to prevent the further spread of this dreaded disease."

Under the regulations, bees on combs or foundation, used hives or other used apiary equipment can not be shipped into North Carolina; however, bees in certified packages are permitted, Brannon explained.

A department survey revealed that foulbrood has been found in 3.4 per cent of all colonies of bees inspected by the Entomology Division's apiary inspector.

Approximately 11,250 colonies have been inspected by the department, with disease eradication work now being concentrated in Haywood, Beaufort, Hyde, Martin, Robeson and Washington counties.

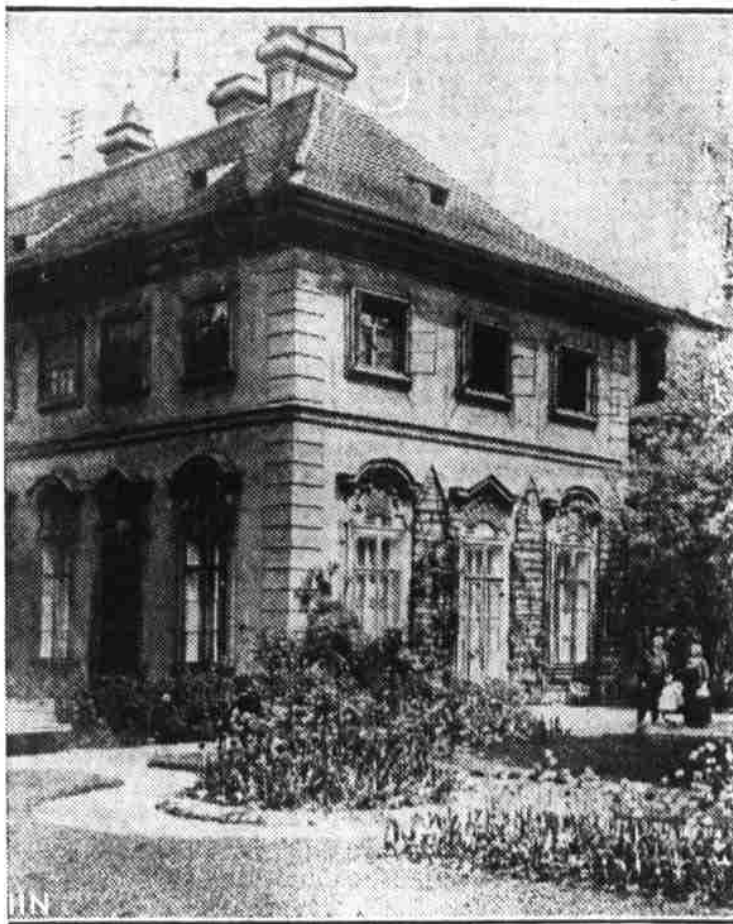

## Along the N. C. FARM FRONTS

### N. C. IN LEAD

North Carolina, with a 5 per cent increase in farm income during the first seven months of 1938, was the only South Atlantic state to show a gain over the same period in 1937.

### TO PURCHASE COTTON

The Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation has been authorized to purchase up to 50,000 bales of raw cotton and up to 14,000,000 yards of cotton fabric to be donated to welfare agencies in various states for making mattresses and comforts for relief families.

### BUTTER STORAGE

Stocks of storage butter in the country on September 1 reached a new high record of 291,543,000 pounds, exceeding the previous peak by more than 25,000,000 pounds.

### YIELDS INCREASE

A general and rather substantial improvement in crop prospects in most parts of the United States was noted during July, and indications on August 1 were that yields of most crops would be well above average.

### PRODUCTION UP

Although the number of milk cows in North Carolina decreased 1 per cent in the past year, the average daily milk production jumped from 12.9 pounds per cow in 1937 to 13.2 pounds in 1938, says John Arey, extension dairyman at State College.

### KEEPING LAND GREEN

Keeping North Carolina farm land green this winter with legume crops is the aim of a vast State College Extension service program.

### BRIGHT EGG OUTLOOK

Continued improvement in the fall and winter outlook for egg producers has been reported by C. F. Parrish, extension poultryman at State College.

### BY THE PRICE

With the development of quick freezing of drawn poultry and the packaging of parts of the bird, the number of store outlets for dressed poultry has been increased.

## SIX MILLION FROM COTTONSEED

The cash income of North Carolina cotton farmers in 1937 from cottonseed amounted to \$6,162,000, or nearly 19 per cent of the income from the lint produced, reports W. H. Rhodes, chief statistician of the State Department of Agriculture.

## HOG POPULATION INCREASING

North Carolina's hog population on January 1 this year, estimated at 1,133,000 was the largest since 1922, reports the State Department of Agriculture.

## FEWER SHEEP IN STATE

The number of sheep on farms in North Carolina January 1, 1938, estimated at 62,000 was the smallest of any year on record except 1912, reports the N. C. Department of Agriculture.

## N. C. 17TH IN CORN PRODUCTION

While corn is North Carolina's most widely grown crop, the state ranks 17th among the states in the production of corn and 12th in cash income to farmers from the crop, reports the State Department of Agriculture.

## BETTER HEALTH FOR STOCK

With cold weather approaching, workstock owners can expect a reduction in the occurrence of encephalomyelitis, a deadly disease of horses and mules, says Dr. William Moore, N. C. Department of Agriculture's chief veterinarian.

## BRIGHT OUTLOOK

Developments during the past month have removed doubts existing heretofore as to the substantial improvement in industrial activity, consumer incomes, and domestic demand for farm products this fall, reports the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

## BUYING BUTTER

During the current period of high butter production and large supplies, the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation has been authorized to purchase an additional 30 million pounds for relief purposes.


## NOTICE OF NEW REGISTRATION OF VOTERS
