Babson founded Babson Institute for men and, in cooperation with Mrs. Babson, developed Webster Col-lege for women, both nationally-known educational institutions. Here young men and women may concen-trate more on the fundamentals and less on the frills of business.

To millions of newspaper readers, Mr. Babson is best known by his

familiar weekly stories on business which appear in more than 400 pa-pers throughout North America. Of unbounded energy, Roger W. Babson has probably done more than any other man to bring statistics to life, to instill a broader vision in business men, and to publicize the ups-and-downs of the business cycle.
