Now Equal \$646
For Each Family**

More Than 100 Millions In Taxes
Paid By People Of North
Carolina

North Carolina for local, state and national taxes are equal to \$646 for every family in the state, a Consumers Tax Commission announced today.

"Various forms of government taxes amount to more than \$400,000,000 a year for the people of the state," the national woman's organization opposing "consumer-penalizing" taxes declared.

"Business and industry contribute only a small share to the tax total, but a large share of the burden is paid by families as consumers," the organization declared. "They pay—usually indirectly—through taxes shifted to increased costs of everything, including the necessities of life."

"Shifted, or hidden, taxes are levied originally against producers and distributors. The indirect tax system produces nearly twice as much revenue as all direct sources."

CTC, a non-partisan organization with headquarters in Chicago, is conducting an educational crusade through local study groups against taxes that lower living standards by raising living costs," according to Mrs. Kenneth C. Frazier, its president.

**OLD AGE ASSISTANCE
CHECKS AVERAGE \$9.54**

RALEIGH.—The 32,493 aged North Carolinians who received Old Age Assistance checks for the month of March got a total of \$309,993.66, or an average of \$9.54 each, according to figures in the office of Nathan Y. Brown, director of the Old Age Assistance and Aid to Dependent Children division of the Department of Public Welfare.

The \$9.54 average was higher than for any previous month and approached the \$10 which the division has set as the desirable goal under present conditions.

The March expenditures brought to \$2,636,561.93 the total paid to the aged during the current fiscal year and left unexpended for the balance of the period a total of \$1,189,768.37.

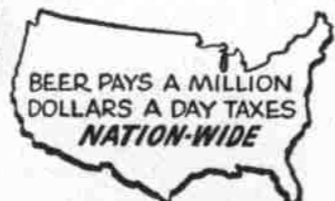

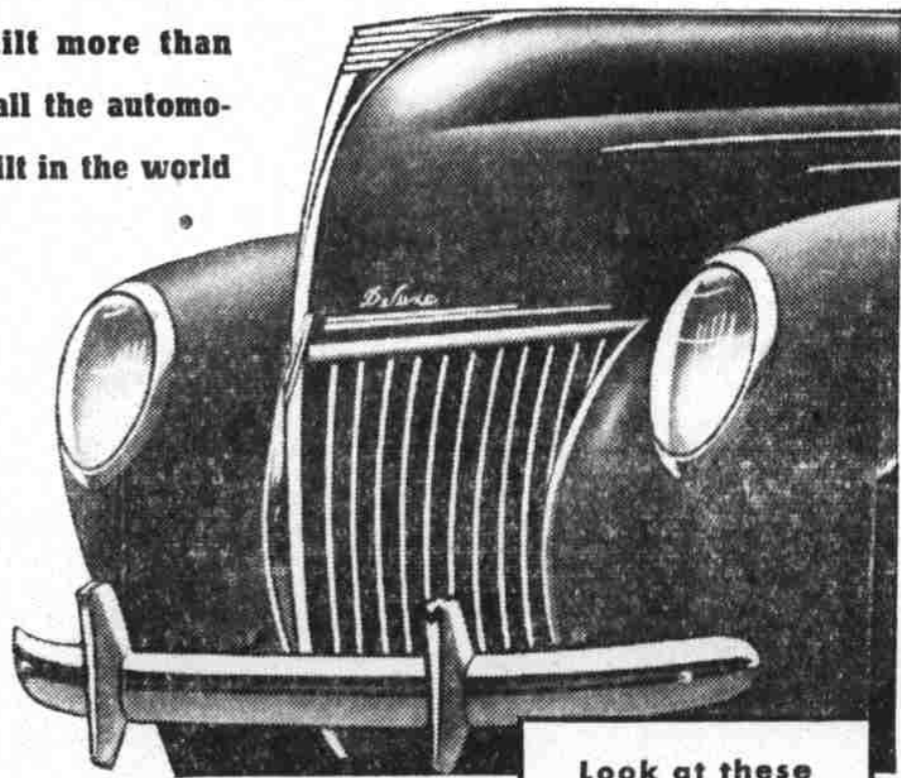
