

### Last Rites Held For Troy Wyche

Funeral services were held on Friday afternoon at the First Methodist church, for T. Troy Wyche, who died on Wednesday afternoon at the Haywood County Hospital, following a brief illness.

The pastor, the Rev. J. G. Huggin, Jr., officiated, assisted by the Rev. R. P. Walker, pastor of the Presbyterian church. Burial was in Green Hill cemetery.

The Masonic ceremonies, which had been planned to take place at the grave were conducted in the church, due to the inclement weather. Dr. O. T. Alexander, chaplain of the local lodge, read the services.

W. R. Smith, of Raleigh, grand secretary of the State York Rite bodies, delivered an eloquent and touching tribute to Mr. Wyche.
