Rotarians Find It Difficult To Distinguish Pasteurized Milk

Rotarians assumed the roles of milk tasters Friday, after hearing R. B. Davenport, manager of the Waynesville plant of Pet Dairy Products Company.
The membership of the club inspected the Pet plant, and were then invited to sample milk from six bottles. Three of the bottles contained raw milk and three pasteurized. Each Rotarian had his score kept, and not a single one scored 100 per cent from the six bottles.
The final score gave 69 per cent correct guesses.
The members were carried into every department of the plant, from the hardening room where the temperature was about 10 degrees on out to the boiler room.
During the course of his remarks, he pointed out that milk is the number 1 cash crop for the American farmer, bringing in more cash than wheat or cotton, more cash than all grain raised.
"Milk brings the farmers almost twice as much as all the cotton, five times as much as all the tobacco and half again as much as all fruits and vegetables, about 500 millions dollars a year more than hogs, and nearly 300 million more than beef.
"Milk is the one crop for which there is always a market regardless of how much or how little the farmer produces. It is one crop that does not get thrown out, burned up or left to rot—like some fruit and vegetable bumper crops," Mr. Davenport concluded.
