that this was slightly under four percent of the present book value of the stock, which is in the neighborhood of \$350 a share.

In view of the profitable six months just passed the directors voted a bonus of a month's salary to all officers and employees.

In discussing the present condition of the bank with assistant cashier, James T. Noland, last night, it was learned that there was a big increase in the volume of business the bank was doing over the same period of last year, and that the total resources of the bank were the largest ever known at this season of the year, the increase over last year amounting to \$202,000.

J. H. Way, Jr., cashier and vice president, stated that last year during the same period there had been 1039 loans made and renewed in comparison to 2,560 of this year. The average loan of the bank amounts to \$81.12.

The First National Bank having a surplus equal to its capital is on the honor roll list which is published by the controller of the currency in Washington. Being a national bank it is obligatory that the institution be a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation which insures each deposit to a maximum of \$5,000.

Officers of the bank are, Jonathan Woody, president; J. H. Way, Jr., vice president and cashier; James T. Noland, assistant cashier; and J. R. Boyd, chairman of the board of directors.

Directors of the institution are in addition to Mr. Woody, Mr. Way and Mr. Boyd: L. N. Davis, J. E. Massie, G. C. Palmer, and J. Wilford Ray.

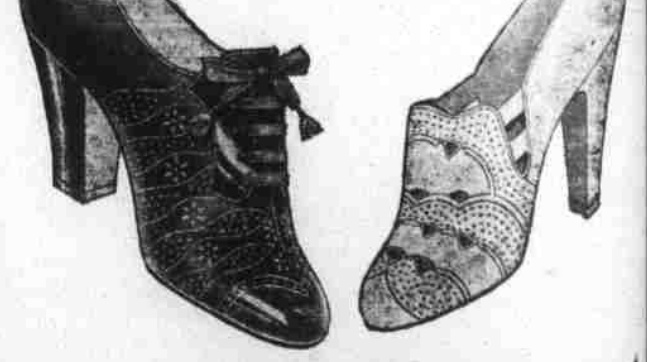
