St. John's Will Open Tuesday With Faculty Of Six

Private Grammar And High School To Open For Second Term

St. John's private school, in all divisions, will open next Tuesday morning, September 3. Registrations to date have exceeded those at the same period last year.

Grammar school classes will begin at 8:45 a. m., and continue until 3:00 p. m. High school classes will be held from 8:45 a. m. until 2:30 p. m. Kindergarten classes will last from 8:45 a. m. until 12:00 noon. Music lessons will be given by appointment.

St. John's school will have a faculty of six teachers. Sister M. Cordea, principal; Sister M. Ignatius; Sister M. Corine; Sister M. Ancilla; Sister M. Julia; and a teacher in business science to be announced later.

Sister M. Cordea, principal, will teach the freshman and sophomore years of high school. She holds a bachelor of arts degree from Marquette University, Milwaukee, and is a candidate for a masters degree at the Catholic University. Her major work is in French, her minor, in Latin. She has had eighteen years of experience in high school teaching.

Sister M. Ignatius teaches the 5th, 6th, and 7th grades. She holds a grammar grade certificate. She is a senior in her college work for a bachelor of education degree at St. Clare's College, Milwaukee. She has had one year of experience in teaching.

Sister M. Corine teaches 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th grades. She holds a primary certificate and is a senior in her college work for a bachelor of education degree at St. Clare's College, Milwaukee. She has had ten years teaching experience.

Sister M. Ancilla gives music lessons in piano, violin, cornet, clarinet, saxophone and trombone. She holds a bachelor of music degree from Marquette University, Milwaukee. She has had eighteen years teaching experience.

Sister M. Julia conducts the kindergarten. She holds a primary certificate. She is a graduate of the kindergarten course at St. Clare's College, Milwaukee. She has attended courses at Milwaukee, State Teacher's College in "Kindergarten Primary Curriculum Constitution," "Kindergarten and Primary Methods" and in "School Arts." Sister Julia has had eighteen years of kindergarten teaching experience.

Legion Advocates Action At Once On National Defense

At the August meeting of the local post of the American Legion and the Legion Auxiliary the following resolution was presented by J. C. Brown, seconded by J. H. Howell and passed by a unanimous vote:

BE IT RESOLVED—That we the members of the Haywood Post No. 47 of the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary, part of that group of Americans who best know the necessity of military training, as insurance of the safety of our country, and to insure a minimum loss of life to those who may become engaged in defending it, do hereby record ourselves as endorsing the principle of selective service as the one method of putting the citizenship of this country at the disposal of their country, as well as the one democratic method, fitting to a free people, to insure equal responsibility to all.

Be it further resolved that in order that our children and our children's children may enjoy the privileges of Democracy, we deem it necessary that this country take immediate steps to provide the necessary trained man-power for our defense by application of selective service—and we call upon the Congress of the United States for the immediate passage of such legislation, allowing no personal enmities or partisan politics to interfere.

Be it further resolved that a copy of the resolution shall be sent at once to each North Carolina member of Congress and the Waynesville Mountaineer.

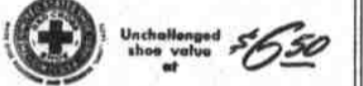
