At the age of 12, Jerry learned from his parent's farm. He finished there, entering school at Waynesville, and graduated from the high school and went to a group of engineers surveying the Southern assembly grounds. He helped the engineers out every street and at the assembly grounds, for several years. When the job was finished, in 1912, he and Mr. Liner formed a partnership in the Junaluska Supply Company.

Junaluska Supply Will Soon Make Their Own Power

The Junaluska Supply Company will be almost an independent center of its own, when the 200 horsepower electric generator begins work. The huge generator is already connected with a steam engine of the same horsepower. A 200 H. P. boiler has been installed, and is expected to be in operation within about 10 days. The generator will be sufficient to operate the entire lumber yard, planning mill, machine shop and store when put into operation, furnishing all power, lights and current for all refrigerating equipment. Tentative plans are to connect the generator up during the next 10 days. A deep well in the boiler room supplies the boiler with water, making this an independent set-up.

Complete Machine Shop Service Is Given By Junaluska Supply Company

Of the many different phases of work done by the Junaluska Supply Company, there is one that Jerry Liner points to with a great deal of pride, in that he lays claim to having the largest and most complete machine shop west of Asheville.

This shop does machine work for several of the largest manufacturing plants and contractors in this and adjoining counties. In the shop are some of the heaviest machines in this entire area. Only recently, extra large lathes, one 3' x 20 ft., with 20 ft. extension, milling machines, shapers, and drill presses were installed in order to take care of all sizes of jobs in machine work. Also special equipment for gumming cross cut, circular and band saws.

Among the latest additions to the equipment has been a portable electric welding outfit. There are but few of these machines in this section.

Besides electric welding, the shop handles a vast amount of acetylene welding and brazing. Also blacksmith work of all kinds.

In connection with the machine shop, general garage work of every nature is done. The shop is manned by four competent mechanics. "Our machine shop is equipped

to handle any size job—from a steam shovel to a small motor," Mr. Liner said.

"And speaking of motors, we have made a specialty of making bearings for large motors, and doing general machine and heavy lathe work."

The machine shop is housed in a brick and steel building 40x100. The entire side, front and rear, being made of steel sash, affording ample daylight.

Jerry Liner Operates Model Farm As Hobby, And Makes A Good Profit

Jerry Liner's hobby is a business.

In fact, many people would consider it a big job. With him it is still a hobby—that of operating a modern 100 acre farm, with an up-to-date dairy, a truck farm, and growing enough feed to keep all his stock extra fat.

Back in the Liner Cove, a few hundred yard from Highway No. 23, Mr. Liner not only has a model farm, but one of the most beautiful homes in Haywood County. It is around this home that he has built his farm. And it is in this home that he spends his spare time, with wife and four children.

One of the most beautiful and finest pastures in the entire mountain district, is the 60 acres of blue grass which he looks after as he would a flower garden. Twice each year he "feeds" his blue grass with lime and phosphate, using about twice the amount recommended by AAA. On top of this, he spreads about 10 tons of commercial fertilizer. About twice a year, he sends a crew of 8 or 10 men over the entire 60 acres, picking out every little weed or sprout. Regardless of time required, they are to get everything off the pasture except the blue grass.

On this pasture grasses about 30 head of milk cows, and scores of calves and steers of the beef types, as well as numerous sheep.

All of the cattle and dairy products are sold through the market at the store. He operates a modern dairy, which includes two dairy barns, a new type milking parlor, a milk house, a sterilizing and bottling rooms.

He has two large silos, which will be filled to capacity this fall. One holds 80 tons and the other 110 tons. This will give him enough

feed to last all winter.

Besides his cattle, he keeps about 50 head of good breed hogs on hand. These too, are worked out into the chopping block of the market.

His orchards, and truck farm provide much of the vegetables and fruits at the store. By raising his own produce and meats, he is able to get the desired quality at the time he wants it, he explained.

Two men spend their entire time on the farm, and in certain seasons he has 8 to 10 extra hands at work.

Herman Holder is in charge of the dairy farm, and is assisted by his son, wife and two children, Willard and Wilma.

As explained earlier in this article, Mr. Liner's hobby is a business, and he enjoys nothing more than tramping over his 100 acres, with his four children, patting the cattle and enjoying the great out-of-doors in that care-free, easy way of his.

Yes, his hobby is a business, and while he won't admit it, those who know, said it is a profitable hobby.
