

Five Killed On Haywood Roads During 1940

Five people lost their lives in traffic accidents in Haywood County during 1940, according to the Highway Safety division count just released.

This is two more than the 1939 figure, the department said.

In the state, 12 more had been killed during the first 11 months of 1940 than for 1939. And to December first, only four counties in the state had not had a single traffic fatality. They were: within Waynesville township. Clay, Gates, Mitchell and Tyrrell.

Building & Loan To Serve County With Home Loans

The Haywood Home Building and Loan Association this week is announcing a county-wide loan service. This expansion program, will enable people in all sections of the county to build and remodel homes.

"The decision to expand the territory for our operations, came after months of studying the needs in outlying rural sections of Haywood County," R. L. Prevost, president said. "In the past we have confined our loans on property Under our new policy, we will serve all townships in the county with the exception of Clyde and Beaverdam, which are already adequately served by their respective building and loan associations."

The directors this week, heard a report from the secretary-treasurer, L. N. Davis, and immediately announced that funds were now available for making immediate loans. Applications are being received.

During the course of their discussion, the directors pointed out that there were many rural sections in the county which were being developed, and that prospective home builders should be given the advantages of building and loan services for paying for their homes.
