The Clyde high school was closed on Monday and Tuesday of this week due to the fact that practically all the teachers were sick, and it was impossible to get enough substitutes. Classes were resumed

In the Clyde elementary school more than 100 students were absent yesterday. Mr. Messer stated that the school would continue throughout this week, but would not open on Monday unless the attendance had improved.
