Conn had his way for 12 rounds. Joe took charge of things in the 13th, and brought them to a quick end, as the highly rated, and predicted champ hit the floor for the first down of the fight.

Predictions were that Conn would send the Detroit boxer to his Waterloo, charging he had lost his incentive; had been eating too much, didn't need the money and for lack of opposition was not inspired.

The experts will likely explain today, that the 12 rounds of terriffic punching which Conn inflicted upon him, brought Joe to his old self, as he waded in on the 13th round for the smashing blow that sent Billy down like the tornadoed Bismarck,

Conn was rated as a good boxer, but lacked punch,
