Joe Louis Knocks Out Conn In 13th

The path of roses which Billy Conn tread last night for 12 rounds as he pounded and pelted Joe Louis about the ring, became a briar patch of defeat, as the Champion came to his old fighting self and sent home the punch and also the 50,000 customers and his crown back on its pedestal.

Conn had his way for 12 rounds. Joe took charge of things in the 13th, and brought them to a quick end, as the highly rated, and predicted champ hit the floor for the first down of the fight.

Predictions were that Conn would send the Detroit boxer to his Waterloo, charging he had lost his incentive; had been eating too much, didn't need the money and for lack of opposition was not inspired.

The experts will likely explain today, that the 12 rounds of terrific punching which Conn inflicted upon him, brought Joe to his old self, as he waded in on the 13th round for the smashing blow that sent Billy down like the tornadoed Bismarck.

Conn was rated as a good boxer, but lacked punch.

Louis had the winning punch, and retained his title.

Local FFA Chapter Wins For Third Time In State

The Smoky Mountains National Park Chapter Future Farmers of America was again selected as State winner in the chapter contest for the past year. This is the third time the local chapter has been selected as State winner and the sixth consecutive time to place first in the western district.

The chapter underwrote various sums of money for the members, bought and sold supplies and produce cooperatively, members averaged seven and a half projects per boy, had five members elevated to State Farmer degree and two members elected to American Farmer degree.

One member was selected as outstanding student in the district and went to Kansas City. Built up chapter library, chapter raised \$300 for operating expenses during the year, held father and sons banquet, members average net income was \$290 each.

The chapter was host to the district livestock judging contest, a member of the chapter was president of student body, also had the highest grade in school for four years. Chapter took part in organizing six defense classes, chapter house was used as school community center all during year, packed and distributed twenty baskets of food to needy families during Thanksgiving, clipped and filed 600 new pieces of reference material for the chapter library, all together thirty-three worthwhile accomplishments were carried to conclusion.

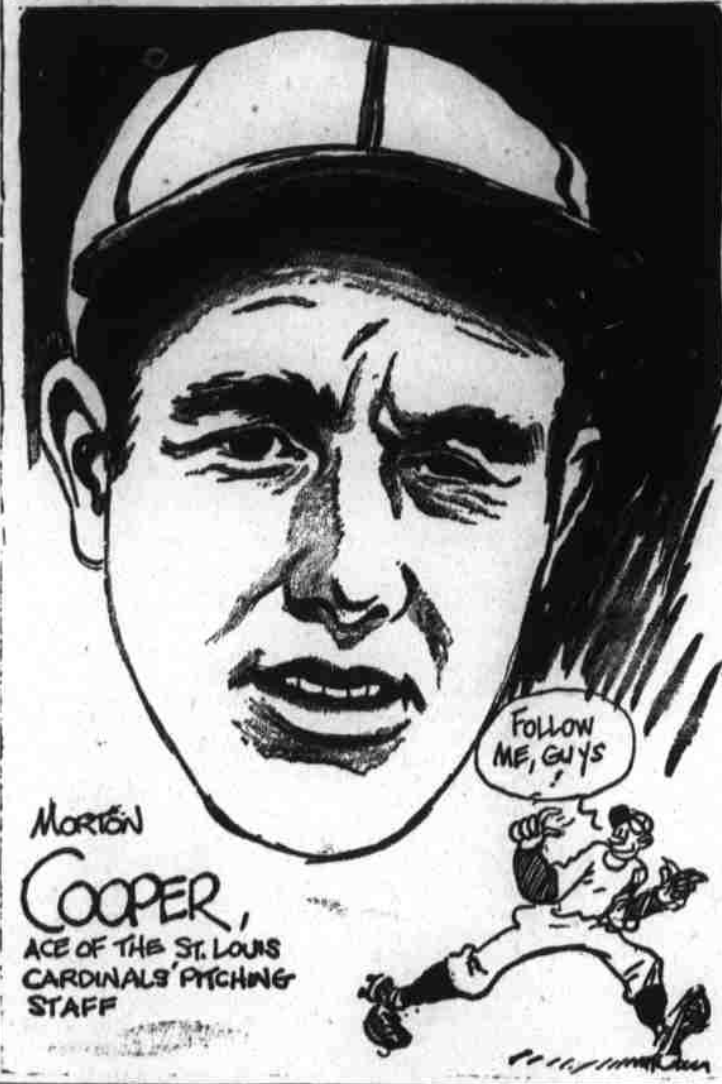

Budge Greatest Tennis Player, Says Bill Tilden

CLINTON, S. C.—Donald Budge, United States professional champion, is the greatest player the courts have ever seen.

Such a statement comes from none other than William (Big Bill) Tilden, who should be something of an authority on the subject of tennis topnotchers.

Big Bill has ruled a few courts himself, but to his way of thinking Don is "tops."

Tilden believes that Budge possesses more natural ability than any player he has ever seen.

Perfect physical fitness and the heritage of a perfect "tennis build" have aided Don immeasurably in his climb to the top of the net heap, according to Tilden.

Big Bill said: "Watch Budge in action. Despite his 185 pounds, he is exceptionally fast. He is constantly moving his feet when waiting for the play, thus enabling him to make a quick break for the ball when he has diagnosed its direction. He is just a natural."

"Budge is the greatest tennis player of all time," Big Bill believes, and his attack for 365 days in the year is the most devastating the world has ever known.

"Ellsworth Vines may have been more brilliant on certain occasions, but over the sweep of a season's play, Don is the greatest of them all," Tilden concluded.

The last day they will take in Pretty Hollow Gap and return to Cataloochee Ranch.
