## Underwood Lumber & Supply Co. Opens

Underwood Lumber and Supply Co. opens new firm at the depot.

Men Are Employed By Company, 7 Trucks Are Operated.

Week marks the formal opening of the Underwood Lumber and Supply Company, at the depot, complete line of lumber, material, paint, fertilizer, and plumbing supplies.

Underwood is owner and operator of the new concern. The firm is located across the street from Burgin Brothers in building recently bought by W. and R. L. Lee, and remod-

eled especially for the Underwood Company.

The company has been operating some weeks, but have waited until now to make their formal announcement after all stocks had been received.

The two floors of the building have been packed with merchandise. Yesterday the second floor had more than 100 tons on it, while the first floor was loaded in every nook and corner.

Feed, fertilizers, plaster, and cement are unloaded directly from the cars to the second floor, via a specially built runway. Lumber, fencing and pipe are kept on the first floor. Special driveways have been built into the first floor to allow trucks to drive in and load and unload.

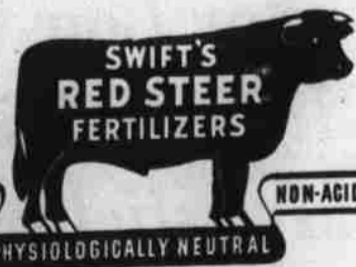
On Friday and Saturday previous the annual clean up days were held by the people of community. The cemetery was donated to the people by Merri:t Buchanan.
