Likewise, 312,-200 pounds of boneless frozen beef will be on hand for the hamburgers that "Mr. Wimpy" loves so well. Although some of the frozen beef is used for stews and steaks, there's enough left over for hamburgers to assure "Wimpy" more than his usual quota.

It will cost Uncle Sam just about \$600,000 to feed the 41,000 men here during the month of Au-

In the list of foods that will be purchased at the post are some staggering figures compiled by First Lieut. Daniel E. Smalle, post sales officer. Included are 1,955,640 eggs and 109,220 pounds of bacon to be served at breakfast along with the eggs.

Then there are 71,380 pounds of offee together with 246,820 pounds of sugar to sweeten it and other foods including no less than 6,880 cases of dry cereal.

On Sunday Fort Jackson soldiers look for something a little fancy on mess hall tables. Featured this month will be 40,850 pounds of chicken 70,100 pounds of turkey and the 35,000 pounds of duck mentioned earlier.



#### The Writer of Hebrews Explains the **New Covenant**

HIGHLIGHTS ON THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By NEWMAN CAMPBELL

(The International Uniform on the above topic for Aug. 24 is Hebrews 8:1-10:18, the Golden Text being Heb. 5:9, "Having been made perfect. He became unto all them that obey Him the author of eternal salvation.")

IT IS not known where the book of Hebrews was written, nor when it was written nor by whom. It is thought it must have been inscribed about A. D 67, before the fall of Jerusalem, and it is ascribed to Paul. This is disputed however, and some say Timothy

It really is immaterial who wrote it, as the lesson contained therein is just as potent for good. no matter who the author was. It was written to the Jewish Christians, especially to those who may have been discouraged with the then new religion for which they were likely to be persecuted. and who wished to return to their old religion-Judaism

The writer points out the old covenant of the Lord with Moses "as not the best possible, so God had made a new covenant, with Christ as the only mediator beto cen Himself and man.

He describes the old tabernacle, which was built after Moses' talk with God in the Mount.

"For there was a tabernacle made, the first wherein was the candlestick, and the table, and the shewbread; which is called the sanctuary.

"And after the second veil, the tabernacle which is called the Holiest of all:

"Which had the golden censer, and the ark of the covenant overlaid round about with gold, wherein was the golden pot that had manna, and Aaron's rod that budded; and the tables of the cove-

"And over it the cherubims of glory, shadowing the mercy seat."

Only High Priest Enters He then explains that no one but the high priest ever went into

the holy of holies, and he only went once a year. The other priests went always into the first, "accomplishing the service of

God." Always they took gifts for the altar.

When the high priest went into the holy place that one time in the year, he took gifts and blood from the sacrifices with him, and with the blood he made atonement for the sins of all the people. No one approached God directly; the priest was always the mediator. The priest took the "blood of calves and of goats, with water, and scarlet wool and hyssop, and sprinkled both the book, and the ople, "Saying, This is the blood of the testament which God hath

enjoined unto you."

The hyssop is said to be the wild majoram, and a wand of the plant was used, apparently wound with scarlet wool, to dip into the blood and sprinkle the objects of the tabernacle and purify them, for, says our writer, "without shedding of blood is no remission.

Now, while this covenant was given to the Jews by Moses, a better one had now been offered to them through Jesus. Through his sacrifice and shedding of His blood, there was no more need to use such sacrifices as the blood of calves and goats, which could not possibly be more than a symbol of the washing away of sins, and which had to be repeated each year.

Christ's death and shed blood atoned for all the sins of the world, and made it possible for any truly repentant sinner to take his repentance straight to God, his Father, and gain forgiveness. No need for a priest with his gifts and blood to enter the tabernacle, or for the high priest to go into the holy of holies. Anywhere we happen to be may be "God's Holy Temple," where we may personally approach Him.

Whereas in the old covenant sacrifices might be offered every day in the year, Christ's sacrifice was made once for all. After it Jesus was taken to "sit at the right hand" of His Father in Heaven in glory The old tabernacle containing the holy of holies might be moved; it was temporary; while Heaven is eternal and permament. "Having been made perfect, He became unto all them that obey Him the author of eternal salvation."
