## Letters To The Editor

Editor The Mountaineer: I have had a letter brought to my attention from a summer visitor to Waynesville who is complimentary of Waynesville in general, however, he has criticized certain conditions he found existing here during this summer. This gentleman made reference to the Waynesville water supply as being unsafe for drinking and the cause of intestinal disturbances among visitors here. I am familiar with the water shed and the system of purification as practiced in connection with the Waynesville water supply, which I believe to be satisfactory. I have checked the reports of the analysis of water samples sent to the North Carolina State Board of Health during the summer and find that there has not been at any time a report showing the water to be polluted. A second complaint registered by this individual was concerning the method in which garbage was handled in Waynesville and the presence of flies. It is obvious that this complaint is well-founded. Due to the inaccessibility of the back yard of most premises in Waynesville, the town require that garbage be placed on the street for collection. This is unfortunate, as garbage containers placed on the streets are unsightly. Many citizens are using improvised garbage containers without covers which are not only unsightly but fail to give proper protection to the garbage. From personal experience, I know that garbage cans are sometimes stolen when left out over night. However, I would recommend that the town officials require the use of good garbage cans with tight fitting covers. Concerning the unusual amount of flies present this year, this can only be remedied by keeping garbage under cover and the removal of manure from barns and lots at
