He was a member of the Waynesville Masonic Lodge, Junior Order of United American Mechanics, and a charter member of the Lions Club.

In the latter organization he has had a large part in all their projects and programs. He served as secretary from its formation, until last year when he became president. His term of office as president expired the first of this month and he was again elected secretary of the club.

He was one of the promoters of the blood plasma bank sponsored by the Lions Club for the Haywood County Hospital. He served as chairman of the blind committee of the club and had done outstanding work for the children of the community.

He had been active in the work of the Waynesville Chamber of Commerce, having served as a member of the board of directors and at one time as treasurer of the organization.

In any worthwhile movement he could always be counted upon to do his part, though modest to a degree that often those with whom he worked did not realize at the time how much he contributed of his time and interest.

Ever thoughtful of others, his heroism on Tuesday morning when he realized the dangers to which others were exposed and he bent every effort to save them, rather than himself, was typical of his life.

Mr. Hardin was married to Miss Lucile Lancaster, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. E. Lancaster, of Hendersonville, on December 23, 1928. They have two children, a son, Robert Lauriston Hardin, age 12, and a four-year-old daughter, Ann Lancaster.

Others surviving are his parents; one brother, Robert B. Hardin, of Murphy; one sister, Mrs. Noyes C. Long, of Old Hickory, Tenn.
