# Tire Rationing Rules Affect Beer And Soft Drinks

The rationing rules were revised today to prevent beer, soft drinks and other "nonessential" trucks from getting new or recapped tires after July 28.

Also cut from the eligibility list by action of the office of price administration were all privately-operated trucks carrying alcoholic beverages, tobacco, candy, flowers, furs, radios, confections, musical goods—unless the hauling of such items is only incidental to the main service performed by the truck.

Only trucks engaged in services "essential to the war effort or to the public health and safety" will be entitled to new tires or recaps after the effective date.

OPA's announcement said the curb was necessitated by "increasing evidence that quotas will not

provide for the needs of the present eligibility list. The amendment also trucks used to furnish maintenance service—cleaning of an office building. In addition, the amendment local ration boards will eliminate from eligibility trucks on "list A," which include most essential transportation. Trucks carrying materials, semi-manufactured goods and foods, may be as eligible only if the service performed are essential to the fort or to the public health and safety.

At present such vehicles denied tires only if the had more applications than distribute.
