

# Draft Bill Will Add 185 Men To List Of Local Board

## Passage Expected Sometime Today; Students Deferred

### Farm Workers Regularly Employed Would Also Get Temporary Deferment.

Sometime today, the senate is expected to approve the revised bill which would provide for the drafting of 18 and 19 year olds.

The president will sign the bill immediately after final passage, general opinion is that local draft boards will begin calling the men by January first.

The bill, as finally accepted by the house, provides that necessary farm workers, regularly employed, shall be deferred from induction as long as they remain on the farm "and until such time as a satisfactory replacement can be obtained."

High school students of 18 and 19 called up during the last half of the academic year would be eligible for deferment until the end of the semester. Men who had reached their 45th birthday could not be drafted without their consent.

Since the supply of 1-A registrants is running low in almost all local draft boards, the youngsters are expected to be called up soon after the bill's passage.
