Local Employment Office Serves 1,318 Last Month

During the month of December the United States Employment Service rendered job information and placement service to a total of 1,318 persons in Haywood County, according to Mrs. Edith P. Alley, manager of the local office.
There were 152 placements made in essential employment. 116 applicants were placed in local plants on war activity work and 36 were placed on similar work through clearance orders.
Included in the total placement figure were: 49 women, 7 physically handicapped workers, 3 veterans, and 1 negro. In addition to this number of verified placements many referrals were made to local industry, on clearance orders and to the Civil Service Commission.
Due to the transfer of the U. S. Employment Service from the Social Security Board to the War Manpower Commission which became effective in December, the channeling of employer labor orders through the U. S. E. S. for war activity work enables the local office to make a more equitable distribution of available labor. There can also be a better estimate of labor needs in advance.
The present labor supply in Haywood County indicates there are yet many workers, both men and women, who should be making a contribution to the war effort in agricultural or industrial employment, according to Mrs. Alley. It is impossible to place every ap-

Jesus Winning Souls

HIGHLIGHTS ON THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(The International Uniform Lesson on the above topic for Jan. is John 4:1-42, the Golden Text being John 4:36, "He that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal.")

IN THIS lesson we are with Jesus in Samaria, where He and His disciples tarried on their way to Galilee. The Samaritans and Jews hated each other, and many Jews would not pass through that part of the country, although it was a direct road to Galilee. They could rather cross the Jordan river twice and make a goodly detour than pass that way.
Jesus, however, seems to have had no such scruples. He and His disciples took the great North road, and at noon they came to Jacob's well, near the city of Sychar. His disciples went to the city to get food, and Jesus, tired from the journey, rested at the well.
To the well came a woman of Samaria, and Jesus asked her if she would give Him a drink. "How canst thou, being a Jew, ask me to drink of me, which am a woman of Samaria?" she answered.

Would Give Living Water
Jesus' answer was: "If thou knowest the gift of God, and who saith to thee, Give me to drink, thou wouldn't have asked Him, and He would have given thee living water."
The woman, probably not understanding, said, "Sir, thou hast nothing to draw with, and the well is deep; from whence then hast thou that living water? Art thou greater than our father, Jacob, which gave us the well, and drank thereof himself, and his children, and his cattle?"
Jesus' answer was: "Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again. But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst, but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life."

Woman Misunderstands
The woman asked Jesus to give her that water, "that I thirst not, neither come hither to draw." She evidently thought it some magic water that would relieve her of thirst for the rest of her life. Of course it was not physical thirst Jesus meant, but spiritual, the acceptance of the message He had brought satisfying the thirsty soul and making it thereafter free from thirst.
Jesus then told the Samaritan woman to go and call her husband. "I have no husband," she answered, and Jesus said to her that she spoke the truth because she had had five husbands and the man with whom she was then living was not her husband. You see, this woman with whom Jesus talked was not even a good woman. She was what we call a sin-

ner, but the Lord, who knew of her sin, still talked to her, giving her the message which should save her. Isn't that a reproof to those who keep themselves away from those we consider "bad"?

If Jesus, who had no faults, could freely associate with those who could freely associate with those who should not hold ourselves aloof.

The Samaritans and the Jews quarreled about the location of the temple. The woman reminded Jesus of this, saying: "Our fathers worshiped in this mountain; and ye say, that in Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship." She was anxious, you see, to turn the talk from her own affairs. Jesus' answer was:
"Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain (Mount Gerizim), nor yet at Jerusalem, worship the Father. Ye worship ye know not what: we know what we worship: for salvation is of the Jews. But the hour cometh and now is, when the true worshiper shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship Him. God is a spirit: and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth."

Speaks of Messiah
The woman then spoke of the coming of the Messiah, saying that when He came, He would tell them all things. "Jesus saith unto her, I that speak unto thee am He."
The disciples returned and found Jesus talking to this woman and wondered, but did not ask Him why He talked to her. They offered Him food, but He refused, as He said, "I have meat to eat that ye know not of." They didn't understand that and asked each other if anyone had given Him anything to eat.
Jesus was filled with enthusiasm and told His disciples that they had no need to wait for the harvest; "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest." He had found a fertile field ready for the harvest right in Samaria. He was telling them.

Many of the Samaritans believed on Him from what the woman had told them, and many more after they had seen and heard Him. They asked Him to stay with them. Jesus tarried with them two days, and then went on to Galilee.
Truly, "He that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal," as our Golden Text says. The wages Jesus received for His reaping were indeed the "fruit unto life eternal," the spiritual salvation of these poor people who heard Him.
Not only in a temple dedicated to worship may we truly worship God. But wherever we are—on a mountain, a valley, in our offices, workshops, schools, etc. "God is a spirit, and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth."
