Plea Is Made For Production Of More Milk By Haywood Dairymen To Supply Demands.

A carload of milk a day is beng shipped from here by Pet Dairy Products Company to Camp Blanding, in Jacksonville, Florida. The first shipment was made Saturday and a car will roll daily, according to R. B. Davenport, general manager of the local plant. The milk is shipped in a re-

frigerator car in 10-gallon cans. At Jacksonville the milk is transferred to Foremost Dairies and bottled and sent on its way to the mess halls of Camp Blanding. The car leaves Waynesville

the 12:30 train, and is carried aft the way to Jacksonville on a passenger train, arriving there in about 17 hours after leaving Waynesville.

"The problem confronting us now is the production of more milk," Mr. Davenport said.

"Tuesday morning we had calls from five large cities asking for milk. There is a demand for an unlimited supply of milk. We can use any volume that can be produced. We will also take any amount, no matter how small or how much, we will take it at our plant," he said.

"The army needs more milk, and we are trying to do everything in our power to supply their needs," he continued. "The army only uses pasteurized milk."

This is the largest single shipment of milk ever to leave here.
