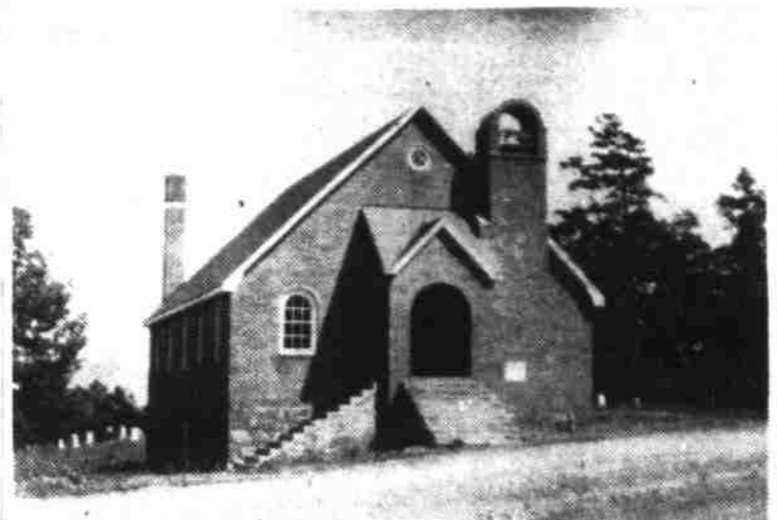

Church In Beaverdam Dedicated Sunday

Baptist Church and Pastor's Home Were Dedicated On Last Sunday

The Oak Grove Baptist Church of Beaverdam township and the pastor's home were formally dedicated last Sunday morning at 11 o'clock with Dr. Hoyt Blackwell, president of Mars Hill College, delivering the dedicatory sermon.

The service opened with a brief history of the church given by the members. The activities of the past year were also reviewed. Special music also featured the service.

At noon lunch picnic style was served and during the afternoon session visiting ministers made brief talks. Among those speaking were Dr. H. K. Masteller, pastor of the Canton First Baptist church, the Rev. L. J. Rogers, pastor of Beulah church, and the Rev. V. A. Morton, pastor of the Rockwood Methodist church, located in the same community.

The attractive new church is of brick veneer with stone and cement foundation. It has a seating capacity of 350, with adequate class rooms in the basement. The clear-toned bell, used in the two frame buildings previously erected on the church site, is being used.

The Oak Grove church is the first and only Baptist church in the community. It was organized September 2, 1899 in the old Cane Chapel school house where the people met for Sunday school and worship services.

Near the present church site, stood the first building, constructed of lumber brought from the woodland of the "Bear Wallow" gap. The people met for services in this church for about 25 years, until a windstorm struck and turned the building from its pillars and blew the bell from the belfry. A second frame building was soon erected, which was used until the present building was started in 1939.

The new building was made possible through a donation provided for in the will of the late Mrs. Mattie Brown Smathers of Canton, who requested that a sum of \$1,500.00 from her estate be bequeathed for building a Baptist church "somewhere in Haywood county." A committee from the Oak Grove congregation, consisting of W. P. Harris, secretary-treasurer, K. O. Carswell, James T. Smith and T. G. Sorrells, was named to consult with the trustees of Mrs. Smathers' estate, and the memorial fund was secured for their building. The congregation, availing themselves of this help, worked faithfully and cooperatively until the project was finished. Members of the Woman's Missionary Union were faithful and diligent in their work of quilting, sewing and other means of making the purchase of the pews and runners possible. Under the supervision of K. O. Carswell, a heating system was installed in 1940, and the class rooms in the basement were completed last year.

Carlyle Haynes of Clyde, drew the church plans as a contribution to the church, and under the supervision of J. R. Clark and W. R. Medford, the present pasturism was built in September, 1940. In the same month their pastor, Rev. J. Howard Hall, moved to the new field of both the Oak Grove and North Canton churches and began his active pasturism. During this time the church has grown materially and spiritually, with additions of around forty new members.
