

Mountaineers Primed For Bears This Afternoon 2:30

Canton Will Bring Strong Team Here This Afternoon

Black Bears Have Not Been Defeated Or Tied In Ten Games Played.

The Canton High Black Bears are nearing the end of their 1943 football trail as they make final preparations for their important game with the Waynesville Mountaineers at Waynesville Thanksgiving afternoon. The game is scheduled to start at 2:30 p. m. The Bears have won ten straight games and will have to be at their best if they wish to hold their own with the improved Mountaineers. Coach C. C. Poindexter said that he was disappointed in the showing that the Bears have been making in practice for the past several days and predicted a licking for them Thanksgiving unless they showed improvement before game time Thursday.

Interest in the game is keen in both Canton and Waynesville and an overflow crowd is expected.

In an earlier meeting between the teams this season Canton won by the score of 21 to 7 in a hard fought game. Since that game the Mountaineers have shown steady improvement and will be in a good spot to upset the Bears. Waynesville has lost only the game to Canton.

Coach Poindexter has been putting the Black Bears through charging, blocking, tackling, punting and passing drills for the past several days in an effort to have them ready for this all-important game.

Waynesville At Full Strength For Annual Classic

Mountaineers Out To Avenge 21 To 7 Defeat Earlier In The Season.

The Waynesville Mountaineers tapered off with light drills yesterday in preparation for the annual Thanksgiving gridiron clash with The Canton Black Bears. The game is scheduled to get underway at 2:30 this afternoon at Township Stadium here in Waynesville.

According to Coach C. E. Weatherby, the Mountaineers are in fine shape and will be at full strength to try and knock the Bears off the top rung of the ladder. The Bears have not been defeated or tied out of ten games, one of which was the 21 to 7 defeat over the locals earlier in the season. The Mountaineers have won 8 games and lost only the one to Canton.

It is expected that an overflow crowd will be on hand for the clash with a large delegation from Canton following their team.

There is much speculation among local fans as to the outcome of the game, and with the interst running high, and most of the business houses closing for the day, local fans are expected to turn out in full force.

As a special feature at the half-time will be the bands from the two towns together with the local pep club. Special music and vocal selections are planned.

The Mountaineers came through the Asheville "B" engagement on top of a 33 to 14 score and without any serious injuries, and have been preparing for the game today with much spirit and enthusiasm.

The probable starting line-up for the locals will find Troutman, Collins or Allison out on the ends; Seates and Medford at tackles; Caldwell and Knight at guards; and Harry Jaynes over the ball. In the backfield, Seruggs at quarter; Fie, Phillips or Byrd at the half-back positions, and Captain Arthur Paul Evans at fullback.
