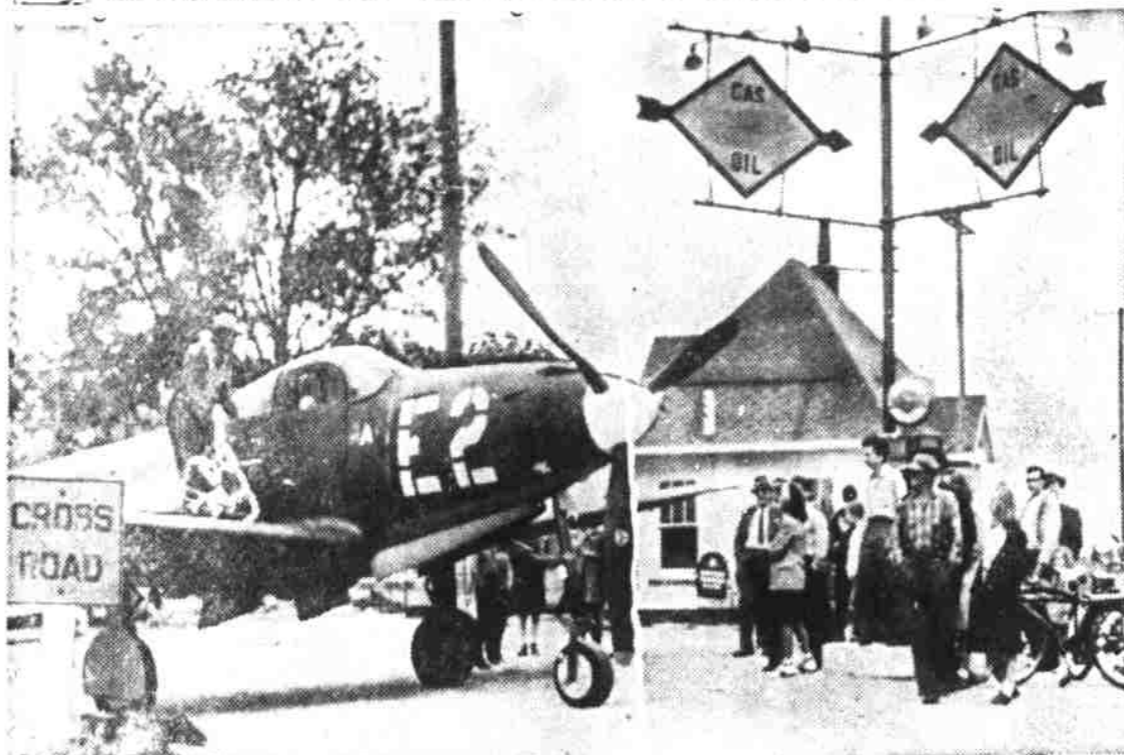

### In Greenville



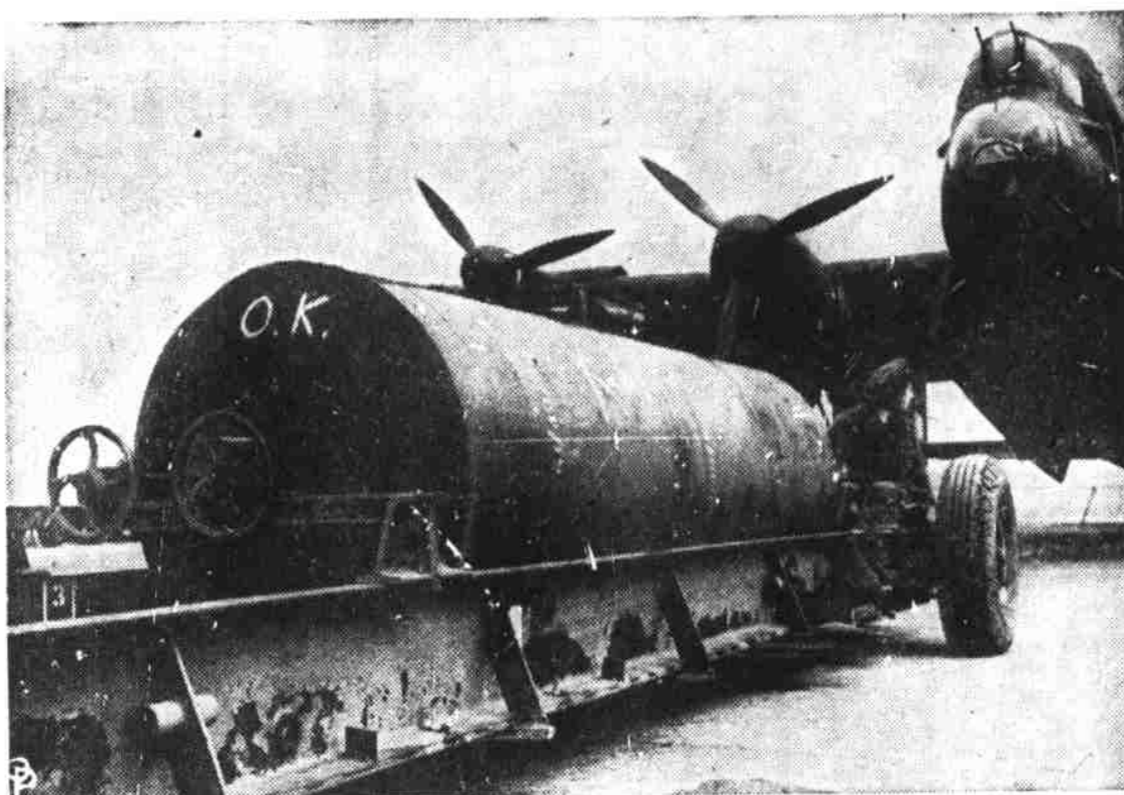

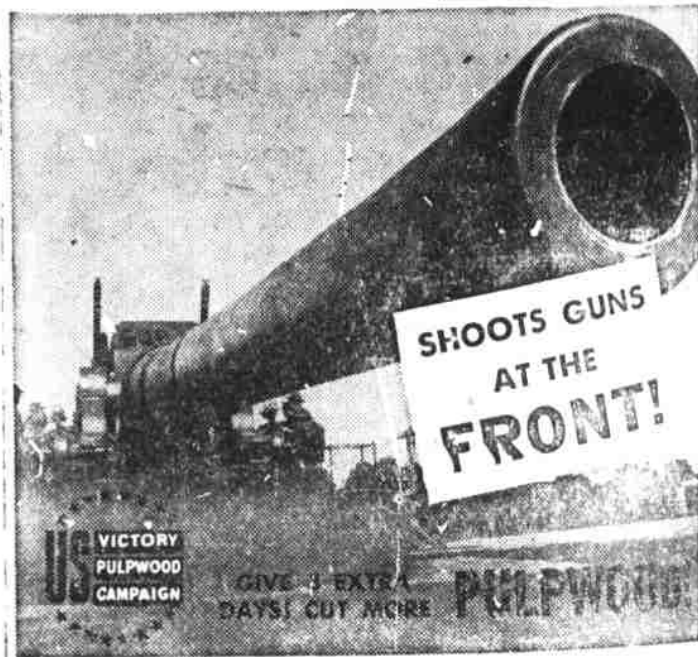
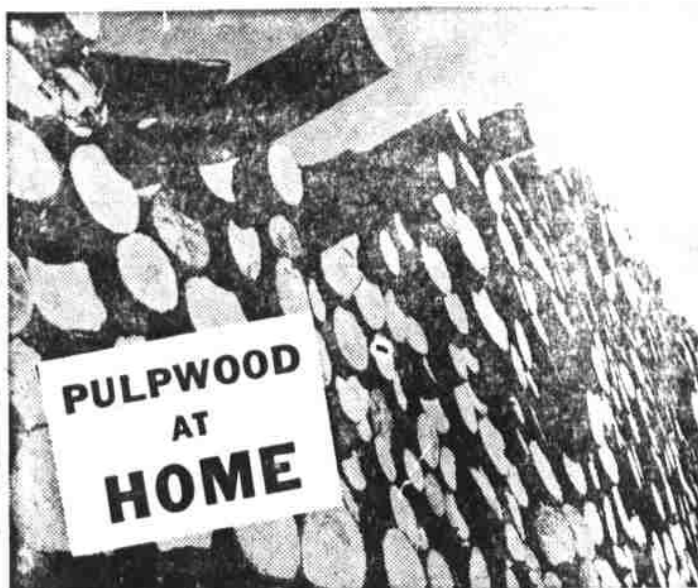
### New Wasp Uniform Warrior at Nine
