Mr. Clapp discussed farm planning and farm implement problems, labor shortage and the importance of spreading lime and phosphate as early as possible. He advised that any needed repairs on machinery be made at once and asked that if any farmer needed new parts to report to his dealer at once.

H. B. Nave, vocational teacher in the Fines Creek school, extended an invitation to the farmers in the section to bring their tools which needed mending to his shop at school for repairing.

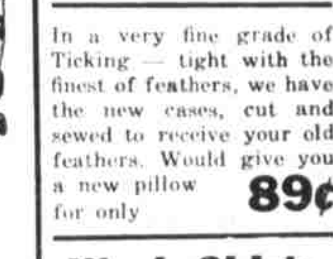
