TOWN ORDINANCE RELATING TO POULTRY

ARTICLE IV. ANIMALS AND FOWLS:

Section 3. CERTAIN FOWL NOT TO RUN AT LARGE: It shall be unlawful for the owner of any chicken, duck, goose, guinea, turkey, or other fowls, to allow the same to go on the premises of another person, after twelve hours notice by the person aggrieved, or by the Chief of Police.

Section 4. IMPOUNDING OF FOWLS: It shall be unlawful for any person after giving notice required in the preceding Section of this Chapter, to impound chicken or chickens, duck or ducks, goose or geese, turkey or turkeys, guineas or other fowls of whatsoever age and kind, which are found on their premises and the owner of the same shall not be entitled to any impounded fowl herein mentioned, unless they pay five cents per day for each fowl so impounded, after they have notice that the same has been impounded, and the day the said fowls are put into the pound, shall be counted as one day: Provided, however, that after said fowls mentioned herein, shall be turned over to the Chief of Police, on or before a period of two days from the time the same was impounded, and said Chief of Police shall dispose of the same in like manner as he is required to do with animals in this Chapter and pay any net amount that accrue from the sale of the same after paying the original impounder five cents per head per day for the time kept by him, and the cost and expense of sale, including two and one-half cents per day per head for the time kept by the Chief of Police, to the owner of said fowls, All persons will take notice of the foregoing ordinance
