Total For School To Date Now \$15,225, Enough To Buy 50 Jeeps.

Bonds and stamps purchased by students and staff members of St John's Grammar and High School during the Fourth War Loan Drive totaled \$14,397.65 The total bond purchases at the school to date are \$45,255.00, enough to buy fifty

The bond selling contest was limited to students, teachers and staff members of St. John's Grammar and High School. The campaign lasted during the four weeks of the Fourth War Loan Drive. Only "E" bonds and war stamps counted in the contest, at their face value.

Among the classrooms the fourth grade purchased the most bonds and stamps, \$3,863.30, the ninth grade ranked second highest with \$2,700.00 in bond purchases. The fifth grade held third place with \$2,403.65 in purchases.
