Wee Lass From Scotland



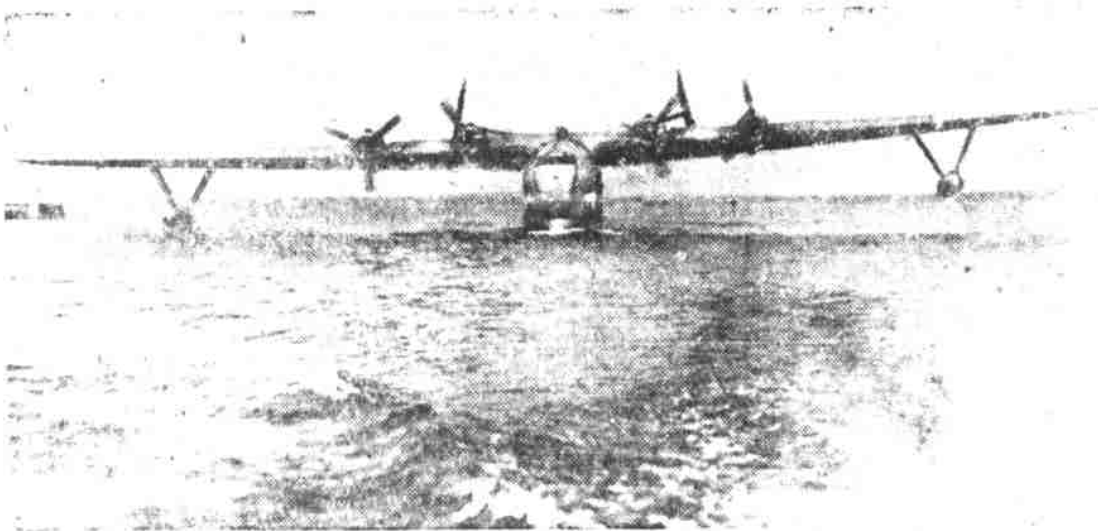

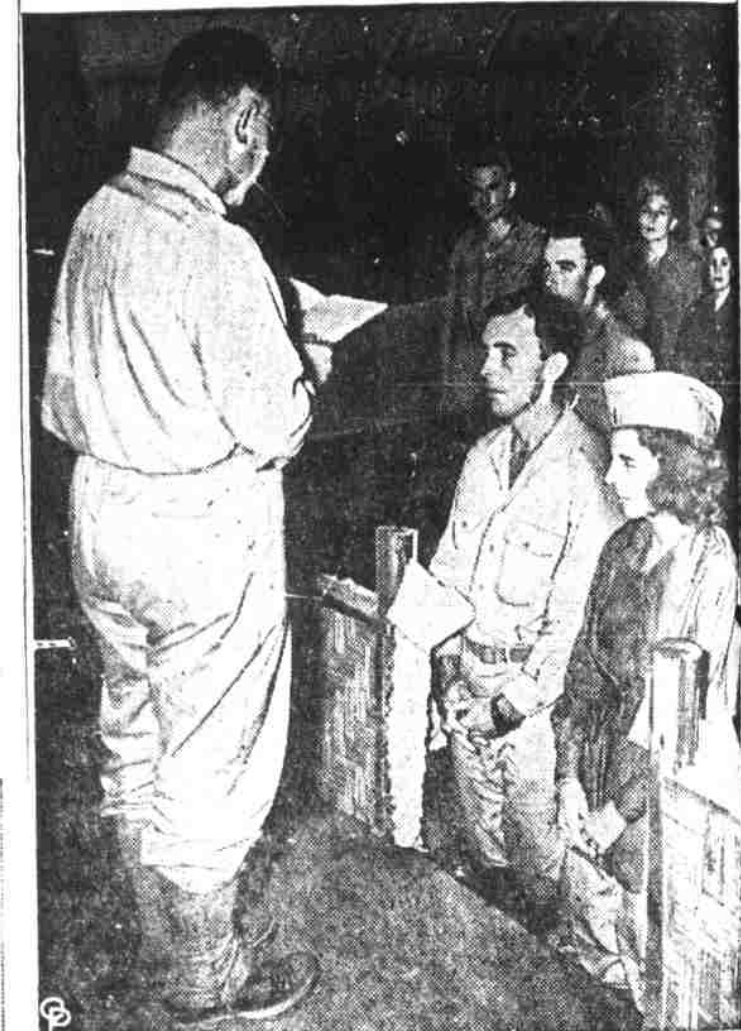

MUD'S COLD BUT COFFEE'S HOT



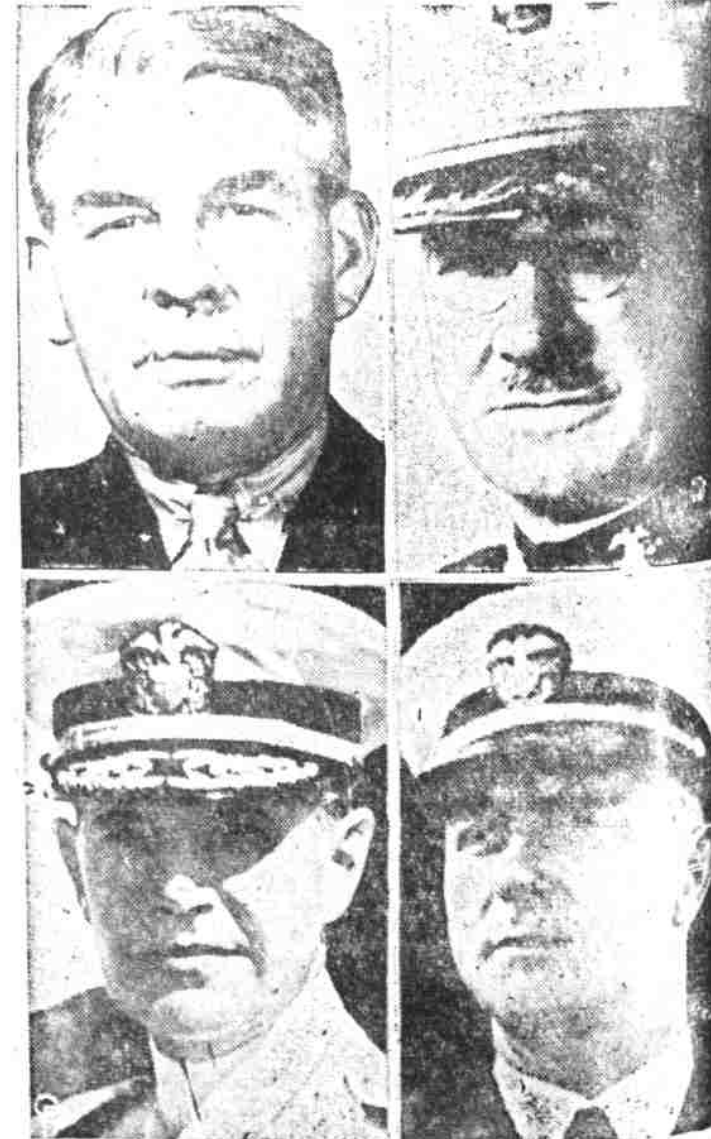
