

Laws Cited Relative To Declaration Of Income Tax

Many taxpayers, watching for the action of Congress on the new Income Tax Bill, have forgotten to file their Declaration of Estimated Income Tax for the year 1944 which was due in April. Regardless of the outcome of the Tax Bill now before Congress, the present law requires the filing of the estimate and the payment of at least one fourth of the estimated Income Tax if the tax is not being withheld by the employer.

Farmers may wait until December to file their estimate and to pay provided that 80% of their income is from strictly farming.

Single persons earning less than \$2700.00 per year or married persons living with husband or wife and the combined income of both is less than \$3,500 per year are not required to file if their employer is withholding their tax, and if you do not earn any other income on which taxes are not withheld.

Anyone not working at wages or salary from which an employer is deducting income tax, and are earning over \$500.00 if single or over \$624.00 if married, are required to file an estimate and pay at least one fourth of the estimated tax.

Among the people who are required to file are: physicians, lawyers, dentists, ministers, nurses not on salaries, business men and women, contractors, traders, independent odd job carpenters, plumbers, mechanics, electricians, peddlers, farm laborers and domestic workers who expect to earn above the amounts in the paragraph above.

Any person in doubt as to whether they should file or not should get in touch with the Deputy Collector nearest you so they may avoid paying additional penalties and interest. In Haywood county

Rev. Williamson Goes To Montreat For General Assembly Meet

The Rev. Malcolm R. Williamson will leave today for Montreat where he will attend the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States which convenes there tonight. Mr. Williamson is one of the four Commissioners representing the Presbytery of Asheville.

The General Assembly will be composed of Commissioners representing 17 Synods including 89 Presbyteries extending all the way from Baltimore to El Paso. The Assembly has 3,502 churches with membership of 553,797. To distinguish the Presbyterian church in the United States from a number of other Presbyterian bodies it is commonly referred to as the "Southern" Presbyterian church.

There will be a Deputy Collector available on each Saturday and Monday on the second floor of the Post Office at Waynesville and on every Tuesday of each week in the Basement Office, Academy Street Entrance, of the Post Office building at Canton.

Admission to all places of amusement is subject to a tax, and if refreshments are served and dancing allowed whether to "canned" music or otherwise, a cabaret tax is due. All persons hauling property by truck for pay are liable for transportation tax on all property hauled for pay. All employers, except farmers hiring labor solely for farm work are liable for Employment or Social Security Tax, regardless of the amount paid or the number of workers, and for the withholding of income tax on all amounts over \$12.00 per week regardless of the number of dependents claimed by the employee.

There is also a tax on all pool tables, bowling alleys, coin operated music and amusement machines, as well as tax on cosmetics, furs, jewelry and luggage which the retailer must collect and pay.
