Oscar Gonzalez, of Santiago, Chile, of the government division in control of the erection of public water supplies and sewage facilities in Chile, spent Wednesday here inspecting the Waynesville water

Mr. Gonzalez was accompanied by E. C. Hubbard, principal of the sanitation engineering division of the North Carolina State Board of

The Chilean has been working on his Master's degree for the past year and a half at the University of Michigan and came to North Carolina for the purpose of observing public water supplies, in construction, operation and mainten-

Mr. Gonzalez is getting ideas for practical application in the water supply plants in Chilean projects, which will be under his supervision, He plans to visit several states before returning to Chile at the end of the year.
