

### County Forest Warden Outlines Rules For Burning Brush and Debris

Cooperation is requested in preventing forest fires this fall. "Brush and debris burning, too, and we must protect them," is the appeal of E. Caldwell, county forest warden of the division of forestry in the State Department of Conservation, in making to the citizens of Waynesville county.

When any citizen of the county has brush or other debris that he wishes to burn, please consult the office on how to burn. It is necessary for everyone to obtain a permit if brush or other debris is to be burned between the first of October and the first of November, or between the

first day of February and the first day of June," contained Mr. Caldwell.

He further pointed out that it is unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to start or cause to be started any fire or ignite any material, in any of the areas of woodlands under the protection of the State Forest Service or within 500 feet of any such protected area.

Some rules to observe were outlined as follows by Mr. Caldwell: Plow a clean strip all around the field, wide enough to keep the fire from getting away; make small piles in the open away from woods

and fences; call in your neighbors to help and have rakes and water ready, and do not burn on a windy day; set fire in grass along the edge of the plowed strip to burn into the wind. Burn brush piles from the leeward and start on the uphill side of the field first. Burn one pile to test the wind, and then only as many piles at one time as you know you can handle; burn after 4 p. m. when air moisture is increasing. Be particularly careful during the worst fire months, March, April and November; keep at least one man on the job until every spark is out.
