

John's Cagers Named "Saints"

Contest Ends In Selecting Name For Basketball Team At Local School.

St. John's High School cagers have finally made a name for themselves. They have also been canonized in their lifetime, a feat unheard of in the annals of history.

Henceforth they're the "Saints." The nickname was selected from the several hundred submissions in a contest to select an original moniker for the local high school athletic teams. James E. Kirkpatrick, first class torpedo M., enlisted in the navy in November, 1937. He is a graduate of the Fines Creek high school. He served in the Sicilian campaign and has also served in the Pacific war theatre.

Pfc. Paul W. Kirkpatrick was inducted in the service on November 27, 1941, and has served in several war zones since then. He was inducted at Fort Bragg and from there went to Virginia, then Camp Wheeler, and from the latter overseas. He was first stationed in England, then in Africa, and later in the Sicilian campaign, and is now in Italy. He is a graduate of the Fines Creek high school and was engaged in farming when he entered the service.

Pfc. Russell G. Kirkpatrick was inducted in the service in September, 1943, and was first sent to Fort Bragg and from there to Carlsbad, New Mexico. From the latter he was sent to Miami Beach, where he is now stationed. He was a farmer before entering the service.

Lewis R. Kirkpatrick, seaman first class, enlisted in the Navy on December 27, 1943. He took his boot training at Bainbridge, Md., and from there was sent to Norfolk, Va. From the latter he was sent to New York and since then has served in the African and South American areas. Before entering the service he was engaged in farming in the Fines Creek section of the county.
