Medford, who entered the irmy on his 28th birthday July 28, 1942, landed in France on D-day with the hard fighting 82nd Airborne division and soon earned the respect and praise of his superior fficers in the many battles which raged until the main force invadd the continent.

Maj. Gen. James M. Cavin, commanding general of the 82nd, in writing to the Medfords about the death of their son, stated: "Sgt.
