I have read "The Bible and the Common Reader" and find it a most readable and useful book. The author, Miss Margaret J. Powell, has written a book which is both readable and useful. It is a book which should be in every home and in every library.

He entered the service in September, 1941, and was inducted at Fort Bragg. He was trained at the following posts prior to being sent overseas: Fort Knox, Ky.; Fort Benning and took part of Carolina maneuvers.

When his furlough is completed he will report to an embarkation point and has been ordered back to Italy for duty.

Marine Sgt. John McElroy Awarded Bronze Star

Marine Gunnery Sergeant John M. McElroy, of Asheville, formerly of Waynesville, has recently been awarded the Bronze Star medal for tossing hot 20 mm. ammunition overboard when a U. S. warship was struck by an enemy bomb.

Although "slightly wounded" by ammunition, his citation says, Gunnery Sergeant McElroy "immediately took charge of disposal of scattered twenty millimeter ammunition, some of which was hot. He personally threw overboard a shell which exploded just as it reached the water. He then relieved a group captain and did not apply for first aid treatment until the action was over."

This incident occurred on June 19, 1944, according to a recent communication from headquarters. Sgt. McElroy entered the service on December 17, 1941. His wife, Mrs. Lillian Jane McElroy, resides at 193 Haywood Road, Asheville.

Meeting Of Board of Equalization And Review

AND REVIEW BEGINNING

Monday, March 19, 1945

The Haywood County Board of Commissioners will sit as a Board of Equalization and Review beginning Monday, March 19th, at the commissioner's office in the Court House in the town of Waynesville, for the purpose of examining and reviewing the tax list of each township for the current year and shall hear any and all taxpayers who own or control taxable property assessed for taxation in the county, in respect to the valuation of all property in the county and correct any errors appearing on the abstracts, and for the transaction of any other business which may come before the board in compliance with the Machinery Act of 1937. This is the only time in which the commissioners have the authority to change valuation of real estate.
