#### Marine Sgt. John McElroy Awarded Bronze Star

Marine Gunnery Sergeant John M. McElroy, of Asheville, formerly of Waynesville, has recently been awarded the Bronze Star medal for tossing hot 20 mm. ammunition overboard when a U. S. warship vas struck by an enemy bomb.

Although "slightly wounded" by immunition, his citation says, Gunnery Sergeant McElroy "immediately took charge of disposal of cattered twenty millimeter ammunition, some of which was hot. He personally threw overboard a shell which exploded just as it reached the water. He then relieved a group captain and did not apply for first aid treatment until the action was over.

This incident occurred on June 19, 1944, according to a recent communication from headquarters. Sgt. McElroy entered the service on December 17, 1941. His wife, Mrs. Lillian Jane McElroy, resides at 193 Haywood Road, Asheville.
