Q. Why must I file a consumer declaration?

A. So that the drastically reduced supplies of solid fuels can be equitably distributed. The Solid Fuels Administration has found it necessary to limit to 80% of a normal year's supply virtually all coals and coke for "domestic consumption". This reduction was made necessary because of lack of manpower at the mines, increased demands of war industries, and an unprecedented burden upon the nation's transportation system.

Q. When must I file my consumer declaration?

A. The sooner the better. In any case, if you file it and place an order with your regular dealer before May 15 he is required to deliver at least 30% of a full year's supply before October 1, provided you will accept the kind of fuel he has to offer.

Q. How can I go along on my new allotment?

A. (1) CONSERVE! Stop furnace early this spring. Start furnace late this fall. (2) Keep temperature at 68° or lower during day—lower at night; (3) Install insulation, storm sash, weatherstripping, and automatic heating controls, if possible. Seal up building cracks. Do it this summer; (4) Close up unused rooms and cut off heat; (5) Repair and clean furnace this summer—clean regularly in winter; (6) Learn how to operate your furnace economically.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, it is obligatory to preserve the rapidly dwindling supply of passenger automobiles for vital war transportation;

WHEREAS, it is necessary as a patriotic and humanitarian duty, to reduce the frightful toll of automobile accident fatalities and injuries to an absolute minimum; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by authoritative investigation that faulty, brakes are a contributing factor in most automobile traffic accidents; and

WHEREAS, the police officers of the nation under the aegis of the International Association and Chiefs of Police have instituted a nation-wide Brake Emphasis Program; and

WHEREAS, the Nation-Wide Brake Emphasis Program, to have its fullest measure of success in saving lives, reducing injuries, and extending the usefulness of irreplaceable automobiles, must have the complete support of all the public;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, J. H. Way, Jr., Mayor of the City of Waynesville, N. C., do hereby proclaim the period from April 1 to June 1, 1945, as a period for the correction of faulty automobile brakes; and I do adjure the citizens of this community, both individually and through their organized groups, to cooperate with our police officers by having the brakes of cars checked and put in proper working condition during this significant period.
