## Waffles Nice for Breakfast

NUTRITIONISTS have centered the spotlight on the American breakfast in the last few years. Most of us don't get an adequate meal to start our busy days, they say. That doesn't happen to be true of me, but I know it is of many—especially the younger generation.

### Today's Menu

Fruit, Fruit Juice or Tomato Juice  
Cereal or Egg or Both  
Bread or Toast and Butter  
Milk for Children, Milk, Coffee or Tea for Adults  
Bacon or Ham may be Added

Of course you may not be able to get ham or bacon, but you can have Griddle Cakes, Waffles, hot biscuits or muffins, etc., and sausage occasionally when it is available. My butcher taught me to take the long, thick country sausage and to cut it in pieces, take off the skin and make patties of it. It cooks more quickly and thoroughly.

Griddle Cakes  
2 c. sifted flour 1/2 c. boiling water  
4 tps. baking powder

1 tsp. salt 1/4 c. evaporated or rich fresh milk  
1 egg  
Sift flour, measure and sift twice again with baking powder and salt. Melt shortening in boiling water, add milk and beaten egg, combine quickly with dry ingredients. Bake slowly on hot, slightly greased iron griddle or on ungreased aluminum griddle. Serves 6.

Oatmeal Waffles  
2 c. evaporated or rich fresh milk 6 tps. melted fat  
2 tps. vinegar 1/2 c. sifted flour  
2 c. quick cooking oatmeal 1/2 tsp. soda  
2 eggs, separated 2 1/2 tps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt

Mix milk with vinegar, stir in oatmeal and let stand 2 hours, or soak overnight in a cold place. Add egg yolks, beat well; add melted fat, and stir in flour that has been sifted with soda, baking powder and salt. Fold in stiffly beaten whites of eggs, and bake in hot waffle iron. Makes 6 7-inch waffles.

### Synthetic Vitamin

Synthetic vitamin K has been developed by a group of St. Louis scientists. It is especially useful in anti-hemorrhagic treatment. Vitamin K has been very hard to isolate in the pure form, but a patent, assigned to St. Louis university, describes methods for isolating it from plant substances, such as alfalfa or synthetically from coal tar.
