

Collections for May, 1945, totaled \$62,602,959.25, as compared with \$67,538,499.54, showing a decrease \$4,935,540.29. Collections for he first 11 months of the current vear were \$771,080,431.78 as compared with \$791,046,211.63, a dr rease of \$19,965.779.85.


