CIVILIANS AT WAR
Government needs and asks its citizens in the 183rd week of the war against Japan to plan to spend your vacation at home and leave railroads, highways, thorough travel and redeployment of men to the service in your community as a Price Panel Assistant. Volunteering is urgently needed in the job of holding prices down and curbing inflation. See your local Rationing Board. Make sure of the biggest possible harvest from your Victory garden and store and can for your family's needs. Civilian suppliers and stores will be lower next winter. Vegetables will be lower next winter.

Period 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 coupons, good for ten gallons per cent continue valid throughout the country for the rest of the heating year. New Period 1 coupon in the 1945-46 ration book may be used anytime after June 1.

Airplane Stamps Nos. 1, 2, 3, in Book Three continue valid indefinitely.

CONSUMER PROSPECTS TODAY
Materials to be produced in the coming months, as materials become available, are the following: table flatware, aluminum cooking utensils and kitchen ware; enameled ware, including pots, buckets, tubs, infant's dishes and cooking ware, carpet sweepers, hand clothes can openers, garment hangers, such items containing metal boxes, combs, sets, dust pans and wash boards. WPB is limited production in the supply of wash tubs and wash basins. Production of domestic oil burners is being held up because of lack of manpower and materials. No increase in the quantity of farm machinery can be expected for this year because of the time required to step up production.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR MOTOR VEHICLE FRANCHISE RIGHTS BEFORE THE NORTH CAROLINA UTILITIES COMMISSION DOCKET NO. 3324

Notice is hereby given that an application has been made to the North Carolina Utilities Commission by Lawrence Russell, Route 1, Clyde, North Carolina, for a franchise certificate to transport passengers only as follows: Beginning at Cole Springs and traveling over a private road to its intersection with N. C. Highway No. 292, thence over Highway No. 292 14 miles to the intersection with N. C. Highway 209; thence with Highway 209 approximately 28 to Lake Junaluska, where said Highway intersects with U. S. Highway Nos. 19 and 23; all passengers desiring to ride will be carried from Cole Springs to Waynesville, but no passengers will be picked up from Lake Junaluska to Waynesville. The bus will operate closed doors from Lake Junaluska to Waynesville.

Notice is further given that said application will be called for hearing before said Commission in the Court Room of the Utilities Commission in Raleigh, North Carolina on Tuesday, June 12, 1945, at 10:00 A. M., and protestants desiring to be made parties with the right to appear at said hearing and be heard in opposition to said application are required to deliver or mail a written protest and two copies thereof to the North Carolina Utilities Commission, Raleigh, North Carolina, and deliver or mail a copy thereof to the above-named applicant at least five days prior to the date above fixed for said hearing, which said protest shall state FULLY AND WITH PARTICULARITY the way and manner in which said protestant will be adversely affected by the franchise rights requested. Said protest shall certify that a copy thereof has been delivered or mailed to the applicant.

Further notice of the proceedings in this cause will be given only to the applicant and to protestants filing written protests to said application as above required. ALL CORRESPONDENCE RELATING TO THIS MATTER SHALL REFER TO DOCKET NO. 3324.

First Sergeant Glen O. Brandon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl B. Brandon, Waynesville, was awarded the Purple Heart medal at the Fitzsimons General Hospital, in Denver, Colo., on May 29th, in an impressive ceremony.

Sgt. Brandon was wounded in action near Saarbrucken, Germany, on Feb. 17, 1945, while serving with the 253rd Regiment, 63rd Division.

He has been a patient at the hospital in Denver since April 29, after serving for five months overseas. His wife, Mrs. Josephine Brandon, and child, Allen, age 2, reside in Waynesville.

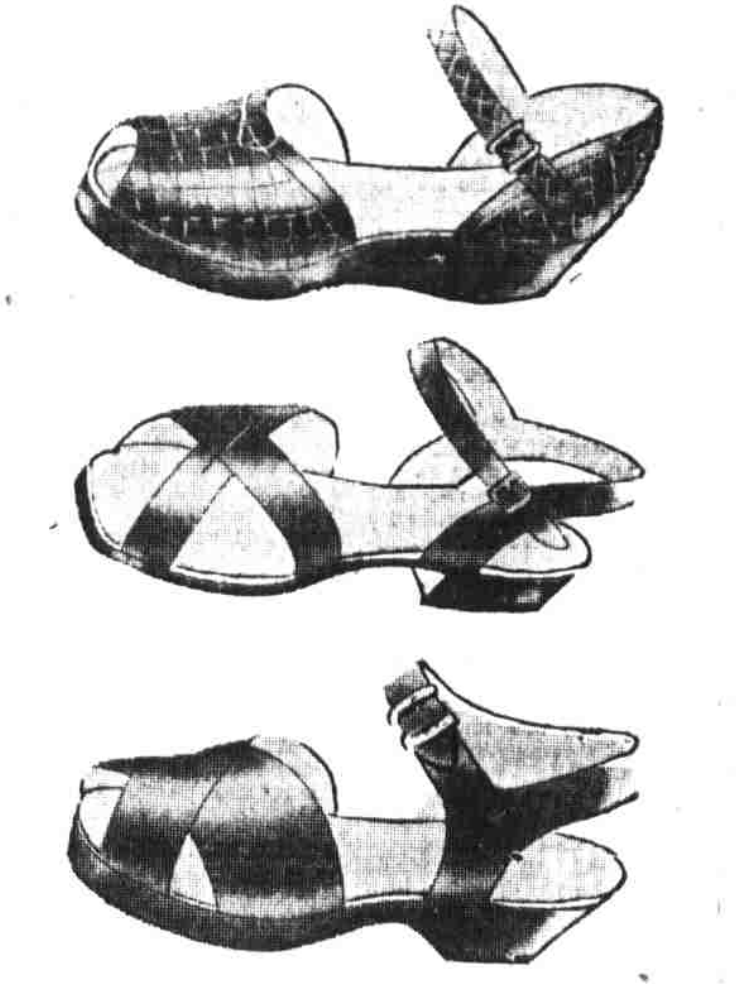
