



One reason the pulpwood shortage is still so acute is that the supply problem is far more difficult in the Pacific than in Europe. Supplies have to be double and even triple wrapped for the long haul. Pulpwood is now one of our most serious war material shortage and is on the War Production Urgency List.

By cutting pulpwood, farmers are helping shorten the war; giving themselves another source of cash income; and helping themselves raise and market their other crops, since one of the largest uses of paper and paperboard is in packing agricultural products and materials.
