with that Parkway. Other matters to be discussed will be schedules for starting construction of sections of the Blue Ridge Parkway in this area. Tentative plans are to urge construction of the Balsam Gap-Soco Gap link of about 12 miles as the number one project of the Parkway construction, and the completion of a 3-mile link between Beech Gap via Yellowstone Falls to connect with the Wagon Road Gap section at Bennett Gap. Also included among the projects for early development is the Flat Creek-Hicintoga area proposed to be reached by a spur line off the Blue Ridge Parkway which would pass through Black Camp Gap. The Park officials have been in Tennessee for the past week discussing general development plans for the Park, and this is their first trip as a body into this area since the war started. Governor Gregg Cherry sent his regrets as being unable to attend, since he had a conflicting conference in Mobile regarding reduction of freight rates. Senator Clyde R. Hoey had to return to Washington on important matters, but in discussing the conference with Mr. Ray Monday, said he was keeping up with the plans and was keenly interested in seeing some definite action taken. He pledged his wholehearted support to the general ideas as formulated at that time. Park officials who plan to be here include besides Mr. Drury, A. E. Demaray and Hilary Tolson, assistant directors; Tom C. Vint, chief landscape architect; Theo. Allen, regional director; Ralph Emerson, regional landscape architect; Sam P. Weens, superintendent of the Blue Ridge Parkway; Blair Ross, superintendent of the Park; John B. Needham, chief ranger of the Park; and Raymond A. Wilhelm, landscape architect of the Parkway. Members of the state highway department: A. H. Graham, chairman; George Patton, attorney; Vance Baise, chief engineer; R.

Getty Browning, chief locating engineer; John A. Goods, commissioner of this district; J. C. Walker and J. T. Knight, district engineers. From Charlotte, Coleman Roberts, president, and T. E. Pickard, Jr., general manager of the Carolina Motor Club, co-sponsors of the conference, plan to attend. Word was received yesterday from D. Hiden Ramsey, president of the Asheville Chamber of Commerce, that ten from that city will attend, and also a representative from Hendersonville. Representatives of Canton also are attending.
