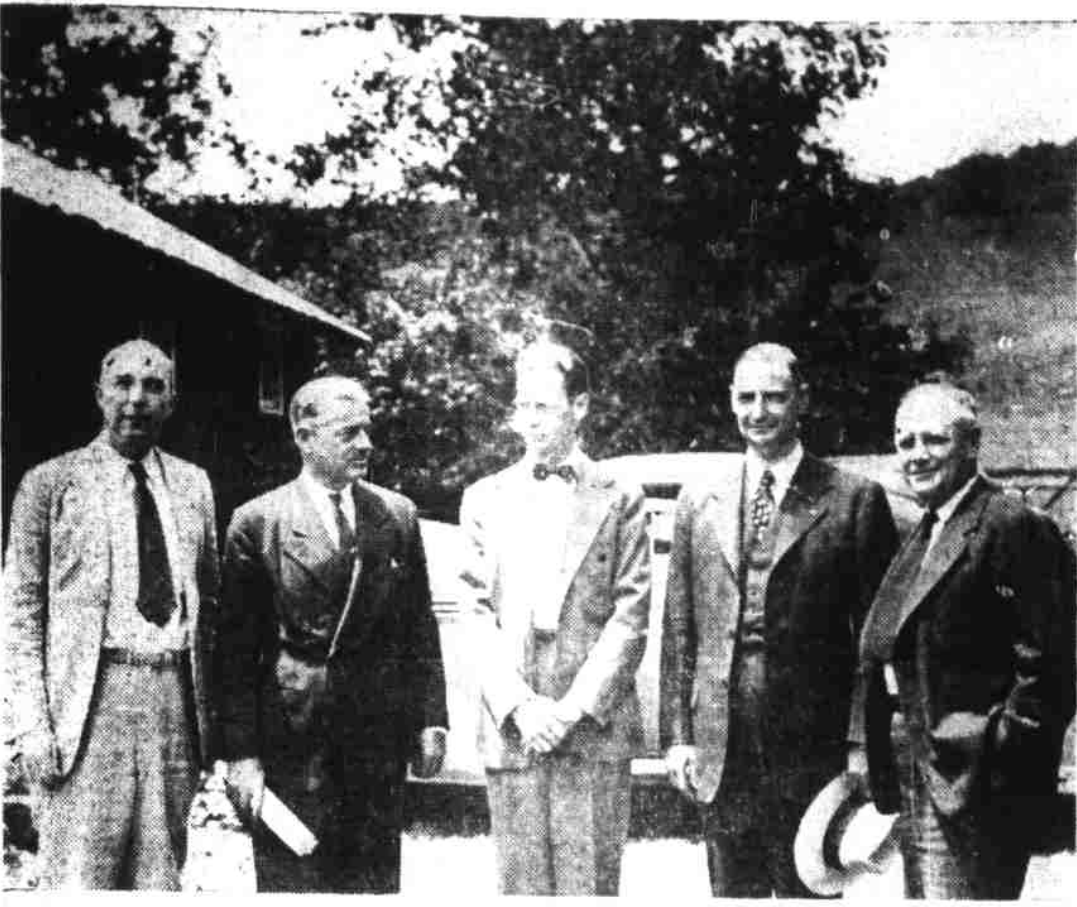

the Park was introduced and pledged that as early as possible he hoped that work could be started and that he had a vision of the Park as a whole in the development.

Others speaking included Thomas J. Allen, regional Park Service director, who spoke briefly, stating that he saw no reason why the requests made should not have priority.

Sam Weems, Parkway superintendent, stated that the North Carolina end of the Parkway has more paving than the part in Virginia.

Thomas C. Vint, chief of planning for the Park Service, told of the difficulties of completing a project like the Parkway. "When you start building roads in mountain ranges like Mitchell, Pisgah and the Balsams the sum of a million dollars doesn't go very far."

Mr. Vint said that the building of the Skyland Drive from Newfound Gap to Chimney Rock was the heaviest construction job ever undertaken in Park Service, but that was proof, of course, that the scenery is beautiful.

R. Getty Browning, chief locating engineer for the State Highway and Public Works Commission, asked that the Park Service and the Parkway officials give full consideration to the problems of completing the projects.

D. Hiden Ramsey, president of the Asheville Chamber of Commerce, urged that the speedy completion of the Park developments. He spoke of how the people of the state had worked for the past 20 years for its realization and that he would like to see it completed.

Chas. E. Webb, of Asheville, one of the original leaders who promoted the Park, paid tribute to the work of R. Getty Browning in connection with the Park and Parkway programs.

Jonathan Woody and others spoke briefly, each urging that work be resumed at the earliest possible date.

The group voted to extend an invitation to President Truman to visit the Great Smoky Mountains Park during his visit to the state in October, when he comes to address a session of the State Senate in Statesville. Senator Brandon P. Hodges, of Asheville, was named to head the committee on arrangements.

Among some of the other visitors here who were recognized were: W. W. Neal, of Marion, chairman of the State Park Commission; Thomas W. Raoul, a member of the commission; John A. Goode, district highway commissioner; J. C. Walker, district engineer; Pat M. Burdette, Don E. Elias, all of Asheville; Harry Buchanan, Hendersonville; Reuben Robertson and Sam Robinson, Canton; and others from this section as well as a number of Haywood county leaders.

A picnic lunch was enjoyed on the grounds of the Piedmont Hotel after which those attending assembled in the dance pavilion where the meeting was held.

The meeting here was sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce, Carolina Motor Club, and the Asheville Chamber of Commerce. Coleman Roberts of the Motor Club, also represented Governor Cherry's recreation committee.
