

### 1st. Lt. Dorothy Meisner Is Bride Of Joe Shipley

 CASERTA, Italy. The couple of the 300th General Hospital in Naples was the scene of the recent marriage of Agent Joe G. Shipley, son of Mrs. Harriett Shipley and the late Claude B. Shipley, Brown Avenue, Hazelwood, to 1st Lt. Dorothy Meisner, A.N.C., daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Meisner, Northville, Mich.

The ceremony was performed before three hundred guests, friends and agents of the Criminal Investigation Division, by Chaplain Irwin R. Kraemer, Waukesha, Wis.

Immediately following the wedding, the couple were honored at a reception held in the Naples CID Club, and then left for a five-day honeymoon in Sorrento and the Isle of Capri. The honeymoon was cut short by the return of the bride's hospital ship, of which she is part of the nursing complement to the United States.

Agent Shipley, who attended the University of Tennessee and was employed by the American Tobacco Company prior to his entrance in the armed services, has been serving in the Mediterranean theatre of operation for the past 27 months. He wears the American Defense Ribbon, the North American Defense Ribbon, the Good Conduct Medal, the Mediterranean Theatre Ribbon with three battle participation stars, and the Unit Meritorious Service Award insignia.

He met his bride two and one-half years ago when he was a patient in the Camp Stewart, Ga., hospital. The bride, who has been in the service for four and one-half years, has been serving on the United States Army hospital ship, the "Seminole." Mrs. Shipley is a graduate of the Northville high school and of the Ft. Wayne, Indiana, hospital.

The Criminal Investigation Division's job is to investigate criminal acts committed by members of the American Army and by others in the line of duty. Since the beginning of its operation, the CID has investigated thousands of crimes and recovered millions of dollars worth of U. S. government property.
