Gets Silver Star



PFC. HARRY M. DYER, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Dyer, of Waynesville, R. F. D. No. 1, has been awarded the Silver Star. He was attached to the 98th Infantry Division. He entered the service in May, 1944, and took his basic training at Camp Blanding, Fla. He recently spent a 30-day tour with his parents and is now stationed at Camp Shelby, Miss. At the time he entered the service he was employed by the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company.

Pfc. Dyer was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action against the enemy in the vicinity of Ottonville et Blerange, France. The citation read in part as follows: "Although withering machine gun fire from pillbox forced his squad to cover while pursuing a group of Germans, Pfc. Dyer, daringly exposed himself to the hail of bullets to deliver deadly automatic rifle fire on the fleeing enemy, killing one. Then after more emerged from the pillbox to surrender, he calmly directed his prisoners' withdrawal despite the sweeping fire of two nearby pillboxes. His valiant skill in combat reflects great credit on himself and the military service."

TVA Will Build \$500,000 Unit At Fontana Dam

The Tennessee Valley Authority is drawing plans for construction of a half-million dollar streamlined community building at Fontana Dam in Western North Carolina. It was learned Saturday the building would contain an elevator to carry visitors to the dam powerhouse and the lake.

Fontana Dam, one of the last TVA dams completed in the swiftest wartime program, is expected to attract thousands of tourists to Western North Carolina and the TVA is preparing to do what it can to make their visit enjoyable.

TVA said its engineers are busy with plans and drawings which are not complete, and indicated it would be several months before actual construction starts. The authority declined to furnish details on its building plans at this time.

T/5 Ben T. Ferguson Awarded Medical Badge

Tech 5 Ben T. Ferguson, son of Mrs. Letta J. Ferguson, of Clyde, R. F. D. No. 1, has been awarded the coveted medical badge of the armored division, according to information received by the headquarters of the Seventh Army, to which he was attached. 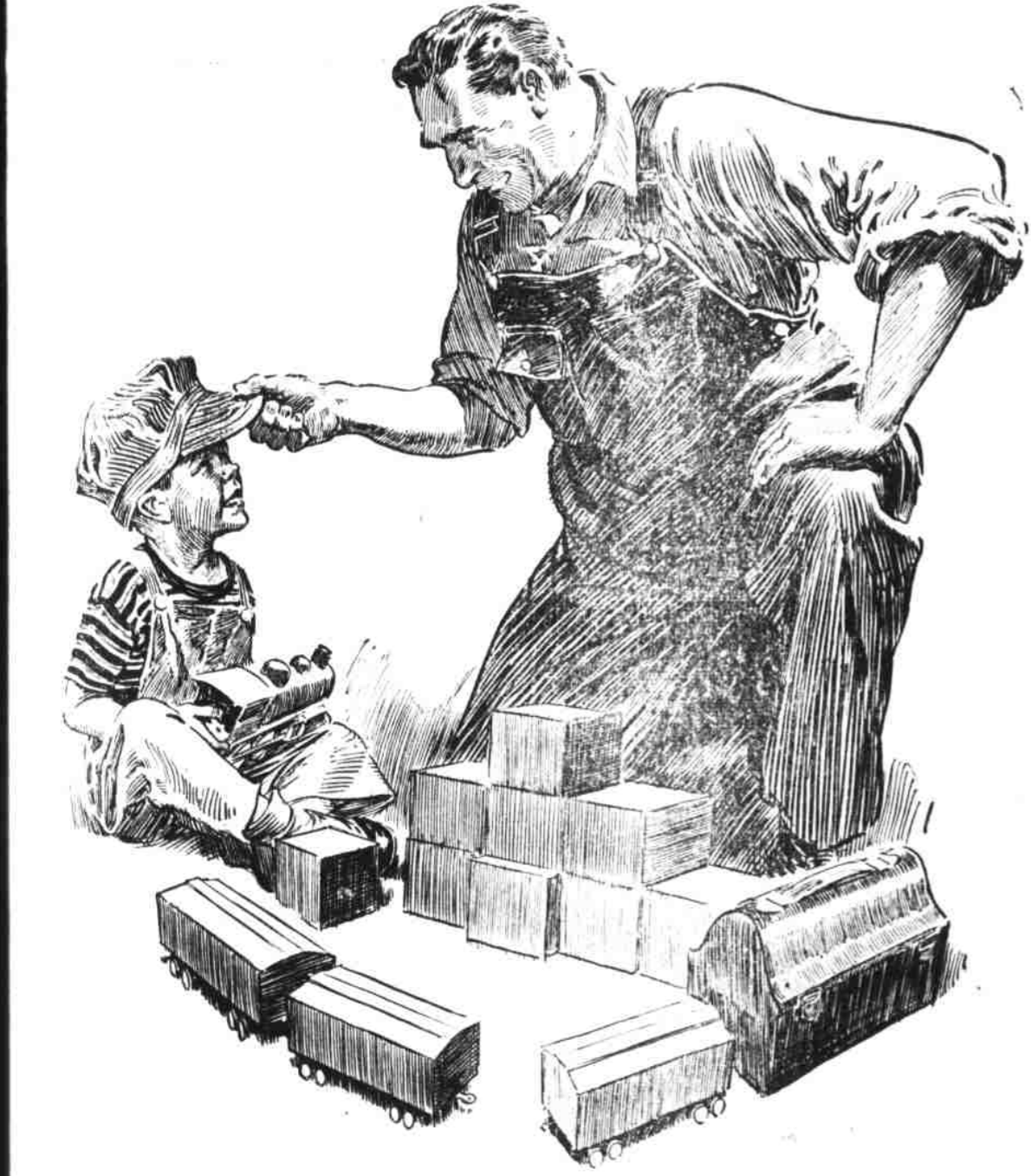
