Lt. Holland, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Holland, of Franklin, entered the service in September 1941. On January 10, 1942 he joined the 36th Division at Camp Bowie, Texas, and with that group landed in North Africa on April 19, 1943. He took part in the invasion of Italy and was also with the armed forces in the invasion of France and fought in the Battle of Germany.

Lt. Holland was wounded in the invasion of Italy on Feb. 12, 1943, and spent several months in a hospital in France on Feb. 2, 1943, and later he was removed to a hospital in Southern France and from there flown to Miami, Fla., where he was treated and later received his discharge from the service.

Following their marriage the couple left for a wedding trip which included a week's stay in Florida and also other points in Florida. They will reside in Franklin.
