Waynesville Came Out of Canton Contest In Good Condition; Working Hard

The Waynesville band will be on hand and a flashy program is expected by them at the half-time.

It is reported that a large following of the Bearcats will come from Hendersonville to swell the usual large attendance of local fans.

Canton Won A 25 to 0 Score In Fast Hard Game

Black Bears Have Powerful Team, Both Teams Played Good Brand Of Ball

The Waynesville Mountaineers went down a crushing defeat at the hands of the Canton Black Bears last Friday evening by a score of 25 to 0. This, the first game of a two-game series, was played in Canton with an estimated 4,000 fans jamming the stadium for this annual Haywood grid classic.

The Bears starting early in the first period with a seventy yard march to the locals eighteen, where German "Nazi" Miller galloped the remaining distance for the first score of the evening. Canton came right back in the latter part of the first period to score again, this time making a 53 yard march to pay-dirt. German Miller was again the ferryman, taking the ball over from Waynesville's three.

The second period went scoreless, but in the third period the Bears struck again. Red Ivester heaved an aerial to Trull, good for twenty-two yards and a third score for the Bears.

The Mountaineers were thrown back again in the fourth period after a 37-yard march by the Bears down to the local 2-yard line, Miller plowed across for the last score of the evening.

The Mountaineers failed to set up any serious scoring threat, failing to penetrate the Canton twenty-five yard line at any time.

Both the Waynesville Township high school band and the Canton high band performed at the half-time, adding much color to the evening's activities. This year the bands performed as separate units. In years past they have played together. An added attraction to the Canton band was the corps of 14 majorettes who blended in well with the musicians and formed the letter "W" instead of the band members.

Practice sessions this week are being devoted largely to work on the fundamentals of blocking, charging, passing, punting, tackling, etc., with special stress being placed on defensive line play.

The two touchdowns made by Canton that were declared void, proved to be double-thrillers for the large crowds. Canton fans went wild when the ball went over the goal, and Waynesville fans went even wilder when the official waved his arms "No goal."

We would certainly hate to be the clean-up man of the stands in Canton. There were more huffs from peanuts than you would find at any circus.

Prof. A. J. Hutchins kept his Canton cheering section from putting on a demonstration when one of the scores was nullified, but not until a few boos had pierced the night air.

General comment was that it was one of the best "behaved" crowds in Waynesville-Canton football history.

Followers of both teams were more optimistic than the final score

proved. Some Canton fans offered 40 points, while Waynesville fans on the quiet said Canton was only 12 points better than the Mountaineers.

The happiest fan at the game was a three-year-old boy sitting on the front edge of the stadium, with his feet dangling off, with the world all his own. He paid no attention to surroundings but kept his eye on the ball, and became as excited on the plays as any man on the team.

Both bands stepped out high, wide and handsome, and gave a good account of themselves during the half. They added much color
