Pfc. Donald E. Morrow Discharged From Army

Private First Class Donald E. Morrow has been honorably discharged from the army air force at Seymour Johnson Field, Goldsboro. Immediately prior to receiving his discharge he was stationed at the Marianna Army Air Field, Fla., where he was engaged in the First Air Force's A-26 (invader) combat crew training program.

Before being assigned to the MAFF. Pfc. Morrow was a member of the 12th Air Force, and he served in Italy, Sardinia, Corsica,

He is entitled to wear the European Mediterranean theater ribbon with four battle stars, a Presidential citation with cluster, and the French Croix de Guerre Avec Palme. At the time he entered the service he was employed at the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, Newport News,

Pfc. Hilliard Clark

Private First Class Hilliard Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Clark of the Crabtree section of the county, who entered the service on March 11, 1943, has received his discharge from the armed forces. Pfc. Clark was inducted at Camp Croft, and from there was sent to Fort Jackson, then Fort Leonard Wood, later on maneuvers in Louisiana, then to Camp Breckenridge,

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
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
