to reading the daily paper and at what a loss you find yourself when it fails to arrive on schedule, it doesn't take long to get the same way about reading other printed material.

We would like to emphasize the words "GOOD BOOKS." There are so many books on the market that it is difficult to select one for better reading, but it doesn't take long for the reason of intelligence to separate the wheat from the chaff.

A new book that will get the attention of the reading world is "THE GAUNTLET" by James Street. Mr. Street has already several well-known books to his credit, such as "TAP ROOTS," "OH PROMISED LAND" and "BY VALOR AND ARMS," but it is "THE GAUNTLET" which has put all the power and force of his mind and his pen to work on this one.

If it is his authority for Mr. Street stands for the military, later having his own church. But the lure of writing conquered all else and he moved to New York where he has continued his writing career and is steadily advancing.

"THE GAUNTLET" is the story of a young man, Jonathan Creek, who is a member of the 130th General Hospital, who has been in the service since April 8, 1942, and was inducted at Fort Meade. He took his training at Fort Leonard Wood and attended a three months course of the enlisted technician's school at Fort Riley General Hospital.

Technician Ferguson served for 18 months in Greenland, including two winters, and was then sent back in the States where he was stationed at the Thayer General Hospital, Nashville, in March, 1945. He was sent to the European theater and he served in England, Scotland, France, Holland and Belgium.

There are three principal characters in this book... Daisy, Dan O'Mara and Peter Lapham. Their story is told against a political and economic background where people and events that have become familiar pass in review. Daisy is, naturally, the center figure and it is she who struggles to straighten out the problems brought about by her attachment to the two men.

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The Veterans' Guide

The purpose of this guide is to acquaint the returning veteran with his rights and privileges granted him under the GI Bill. While not attempting to answer all the questions anyone could ask it merely hits the high spots. For further information consult any facility of the Veterans Administration.

Hospital Care

If you should ever need hospital care for a disability incurred in line of duty in the service of the Veterans Administration, you may also be given transportation to the hospital.

If your disability is not one to service you may get free hospitalization if you are financially unable to pay the cost in a civilian hospital.

Medical Attention

If you need medical or dental care that requires hospitalization, it will be provided by the Veterans Administration if the condition was caused or aggravated in line of duty by your service. Medicine, appliances, bridge work, etc., are included.

Care in National Soldiers Home

Members and former members of the armed service who are disabled and without means of support may apply for and receive care in National Soldiers Homes located throughout the country.

Interment Flag

The next of kin of a veteran who is killed in action or who dies in civilian life may apply at any first class post office for the interment flag for use in the funeral. This flag may be retained.
