JAPS PLANNED RAID AGAINST NEW YORK, REVEALED

Five submarine aircraft carriers were ready for sneak attacks on New York and the Panama Canal when Japan's surrender prevented carrying out their plans, a Japanese newspaper has just disclosed.

GEN. WAINWRIGHT URGES LONG OCCUPATION OF JAPAN

General Johnathan M. Wainwright, hero of Bataan, predicted in Junction City, Kansas, where he was attending the unveiling of a monument, that the allies must occupy Japan and Germany for "an appropriate length of time and in adequate strength" or we may have World War Three on our hands.

The monument that was unveiled was to be presented to the Philippine Islands in memory of 26th Cavalry and Gen. Wainwright's speech was made from near-by Fort Riley stadium.

BARBON SAYS INEFFICIENT WORKER WILL LOSE OUT

Roger Babson's report about the post-war labor situation suggests that there will be, in the coming year, far more "Position Wanted" advertisements than "Help Wanted" ones. He predicts that the inefficient worker will find himself displaced by the efficient one who needs and wants to work. And he completes his article with these arresting suggestions:

"For Heaven's sake hang on to your present job. Quit squabbling about wages and hours and determine to do better work. . . . If the proposed wage increases are granted, you may be faced with not only no pay envelope but higher living costs."

MILLIONS OF TONS OF COAL POURING FROM RUHR MINES

Under British control, the Ruhr coal mines are turning out millions of tons of the muchly wanted coal. But not one bucket of this precious fuel will find its way into German buckets. Holland is being given special attention. The Dutch urgently need coal to operate pumps which prevent lowlands from being flooded by seawaters crashing through dykes blasted in the war.

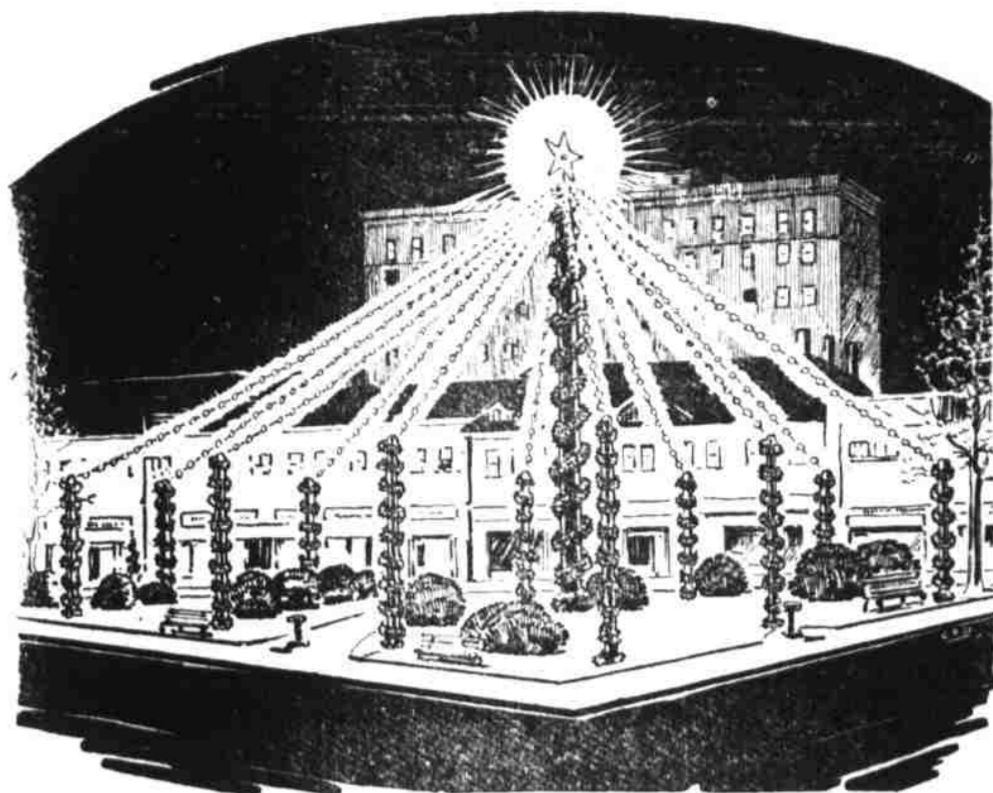

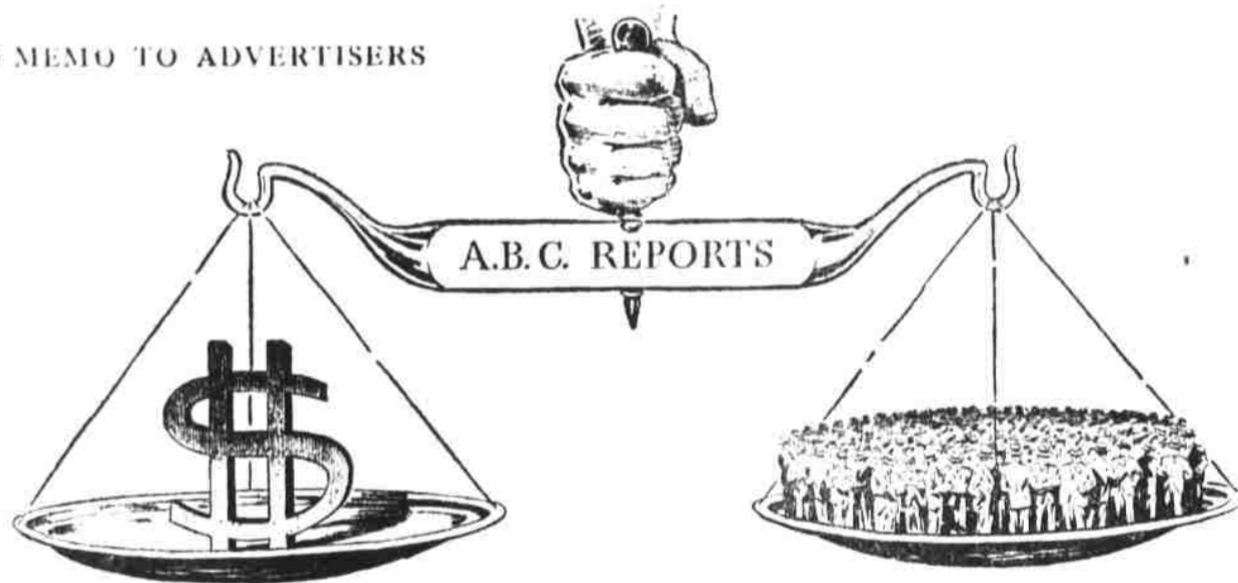
